Mrs. Orr Turns 100

On her 100th birthday, Brookwood resident Helen Brown Orr plans to celebrate quietly with family and friends. "But there will be a cake," she said, her eyes shining, "a Rhodes bakery cake." That's one of the few institutions that hasn't changed in the 37 years that Mrs. Orr has lived in the neighborhood.

Dressed in a smart navy and white dress, the spirited Mrs. Orr expressed amazement that she had reached her centennial birthday. "I can't believe anyone would live to be this old," she said. Daughter Barbara Parham, who lives at 70 Brighton, said the reason for her mother's longevity is obvious: she's always been very interested in everything going on.

Interested and independent. Since she was widowed for the second time in the 1950's, Mrs. Orr has maintained her own home. She keeps up with her friends Elsie Marx, Lorraine Clark, and her neighbors Tom and Virginia Preacher and Joe Myers and Jennine Hough. She also enjoys daily visits from her daughter Barbara. "She's my friend," Mrs. Orr says of her daughter. "And her husband Howell is my other friend." Since she gave up driving ten years ago at age 90, the Parhams have become her chauffeurs, taking her to the country club for dinner or to Druid Hills Methodist Church, where



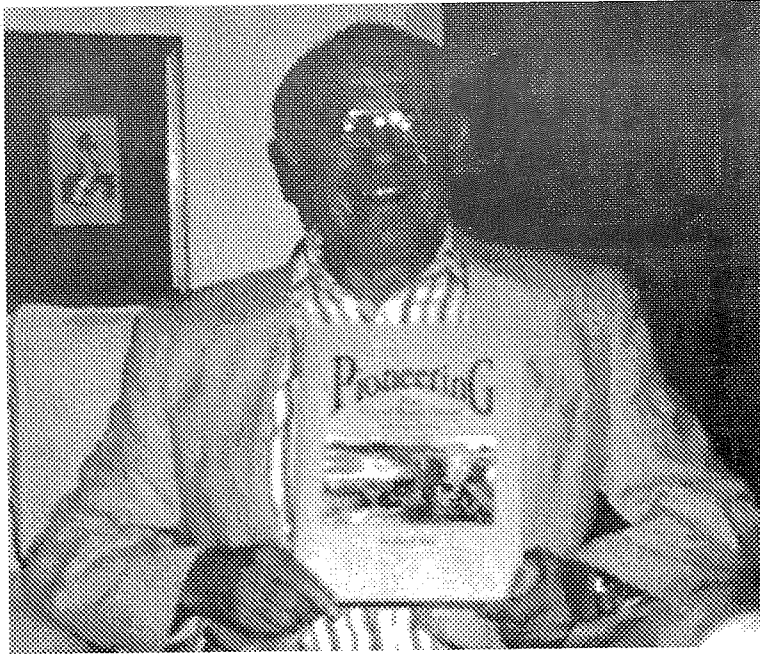
she used to sing in the choir. "She's always had a gorgeous voice," said Barbara, "and trained at the Bush Conservatory in Chicago."

Mrs. Orr still needlepoints whenever someone gives her something to work on, and cares for her African violets that she has grown from a single leaf. "They're old," she says of the lush plants blooming in her den, "Not as old as I am, but pretty old."

In recognition of her birthday, daughter Betty Thomson has flown in from Kansas City. Celebrating with her two daughters will be her

five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Hilary and Bill Clinton have sent her a special birthday card, but Willard hasn't called yet.

Mrs. Orr posed with Alison Caughman, Brookwood Hills Community Club President, to receive a certificate naming her an Honorary Member of the Community Club. She was delighted to hear that she now had privileges to use the swimming pool and tennis courts. As youthful and energetic as she is, we wouldn't be surprised to see her taking up a tennis racket soon.



Jack Watt Pioneers New Book

John R. (Jack) Watt comes from a family of pioneers. As he describes in his new book, Pioneering, From Covered Wagons Onward, his ancestors were among the first to settle Seattle, Washington. Their journey cross-country was a difficult one, walking beside their Conestoga wagons packed with household possessions and supplies. Jack's grandmother was a six-year old when she made the trek on foot with her father, pregnant mother and four-year-old sister.

That pioneering spirit lived on in her descendants. Drawing on their independence and energy, several family members successfully ventured into other new territories, including inventing, foreign diplomacy, radio broadcasting and high finance. Explains Jack: "Pioneers tend to create more pioneers."

Enlivened by Jack's everpresent sense of humor and peppered with 126 illustrations, the book paints a charming and very personal picture of life in the earlier part of this century.

Jack's previously published books have been on technical subjects. He and his wife Lillian, who contributed many painstaking hours to proofing his manuscript, live at 300 Camden Road. Their daughter, Madeleine Watt, teaches art at the Howard School in Roswell and designed the book jacket.

Historical Perspective - The Civil War

The Battle Began in Brookwood Hills

The Civil War Battle of Peachtree Creek started in Brookwood Hills. On the afternoon of July 20, 1864, the Union Army of the Cumberland was situated just north of Collier Road along a line which was approximately two miles in length and ran from Howell Mill Road on the west, into Brookwood Hills on the east. The easternmost portion of this line was occupied by an army Division of approximately 3,200 soldiers under the command of Union General John Newton.

General Newton's Division was divided into three Brigades. At 3:00 p.m. on July 20, the First Brigade was positioned in a line along the high ground north of Collier Road, running west from Peachtree Road. At the spot now occupied by the Sheffield Building, General Newton's Second Brigade, commanded by Colonel John W. Blake, connected with the First Brigade. Col. Blake's soldiers were positioned shoulder to shoulder in a single line running from the Sheffield Building, across Peachtree, and along the northern side of Brighton Road to about as far as Brighton's intersection with Wakefield Drive. Immediately upon taking up this position, the soldiers began erecting a log and rail barricade.

Beyond the end of this line, two of Blake's regiments (consisting of between 400 to 600 soldiers) were positioned as "pickets" to occupy the area between the Brighton/Wakefield intersection and the cul de sac at the end of New Camden.

The soldiers in Newton's Third Brigade, commanded by General Luther Bradley, were not deployed in a line of battle, but, rather, were kept in reserve along either side of Peachtree Road, from Brighton Road north to site where Blockbuster Music is now located.

At 3:30 p.m., a Confederate Division commanded by General William B. Bate began the Battle of Peachtree Creek by attacking Newton's Union Division. From the Confederate camp, which was located in the Piedmont-Ansley Park area, the troops in General Bate's Division had marched just north of the "White Columns" television studio on the present road bed of I-85, and had formed into their battle line. The Confederate battle line consisted of two rows of soldiers standing shoulder to shoulder, one row directly in front of the other, extending from Peachtree Road on the left to Pea Vine Creek (now Clear Creek) on the right.

As the Confederate battle line proceeded through the Brookwood Hills area, its right side became mixed up in what the Confederate commander reported as "an almost impenetrable thicket." The confusion created by the difficult terrain caused the Confederate attack to become very uncoordinated, with the result that the left side of Bate's Division attacked Col. Blake's Union Brigade along Brighton Road, while the right side travelled down and along Huntington Road and went past the Union line and into the lower Camden area where the two regiments of Union pickets were located.

The Union troops posted behind the newly constructed barricades along Brighton Road had little difficulty driving back the Confederate soldiers, who were charging up the hill through Wakefield Drive and Camden Road. A half hour later, Confederate General Bate attacked the lower Camden area occupied only by the two Union picket regiments, causing the Union soldiers to retreat, some running east across Clear Creek and some running west to Peachtree Road. The Confederates pursued the retreating pickets toward Peachtree Road through the area behind Brighton Road now occupied by the Brookwood Valley Apartments. As Bate's men emerged from Brookwood Hills and approached Peachtree Road just north of Blockbuster Music, they were met by the roused troops of Bradley's Union Brigade, who also received support from the left-most regiment of Col. Blake's Brigade and an artillery battery of four cannon that had by then been put into position. These combined Union forces repulsed the Confederates, thus ending the fighting on this side of the Peachtree Creek battlefield.

This phase of the Battle of Peachtree Creek concluded without Confederate success. The Confederate forces did have some brief success in the later fighting of the Battle (which took place west of Peachtree Road, across Collier Road). Blake's and Bradley's Union Brigades reported only 66 casualties, while the Confederate losses, though never authoritatively reported, were certainly several times that number.

Olympic Gold

The Garden Club of Georgia, of which the Brookwood Hills Garden Club is a member, is cosponsoring with the Buckhead Coalition a beautification plan for Peachtree, from Interstate 85 north to Club Drive.

Called the "Peachtree Pathway of Gold," its purpose is to showcase this area for the Olympics. Garden Club members will be calling on property owners along Peachtree to encourage them to plant golden-hued flowers and shrubs to bloom this year, as well as in 1996.

Peachtree Road involves two important Olympic venues, the marathon and the bicycle race. With all the expected media coverage, Heartbreak Hill will surely be a familiar term worldwide come July 1996.

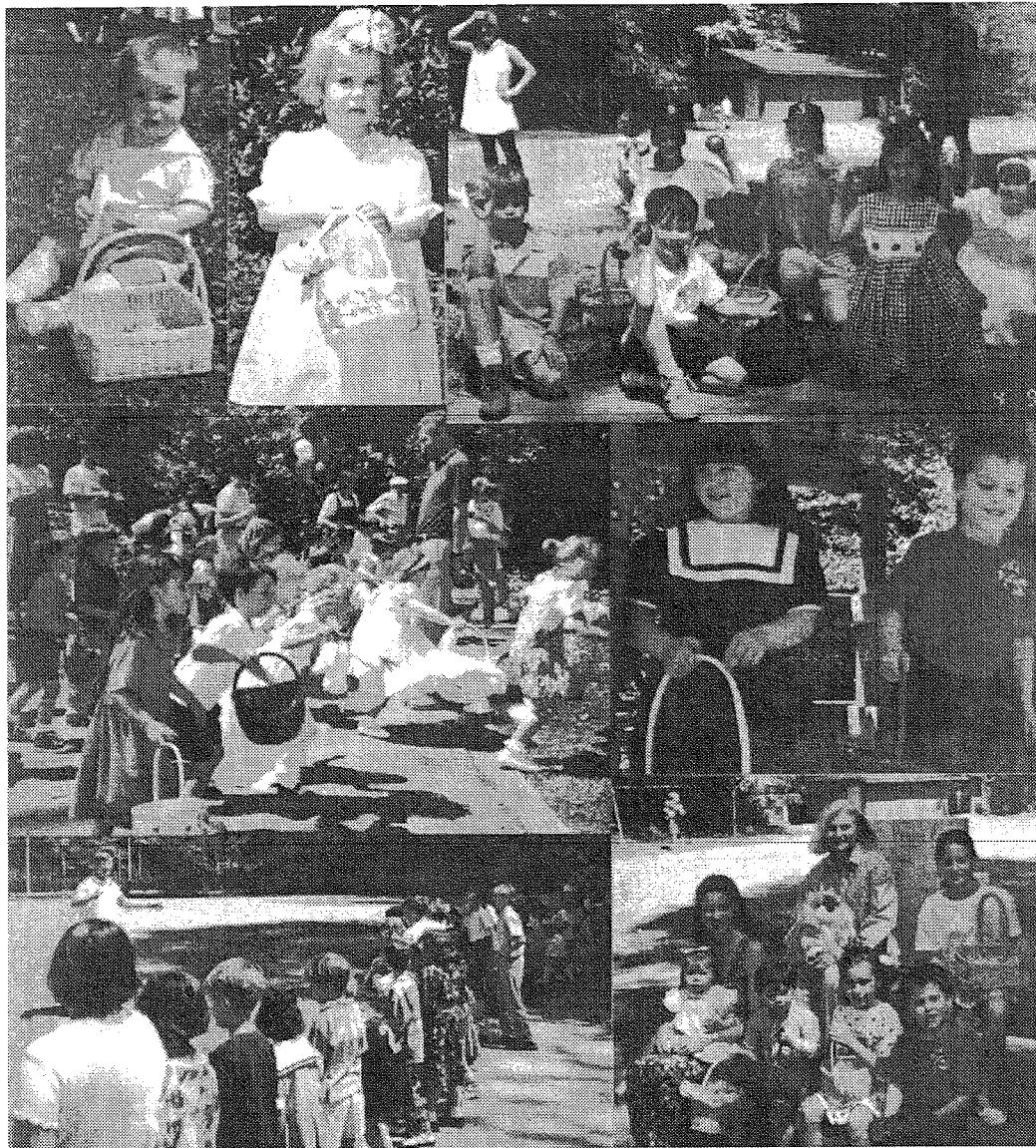
