

### Spring Storm Wreaks Havoc on Neighborhood Trees

On the night of Monday, April 4 our city was shaken by a thunderstorm which felled numerous trees in Brookwood Hills. Fortunately, no one in the neighborhood was hurt, although a couple of houses did sustain damage. A major structural limb broke off a water oak at the top of Huntington Road and took off a piece of the front of Travis and Amanda Szwast's house, as well as shattering the rear window of a parked car on the street. The limb also pulled down a live electrical cable, which was not removed until late the following day.



On Palisades, a large tree in front of the house of Ginna and William Pope fell and hit Larre and Doug Holladay's house. Two large trees fell across from the pool on Wakefield, causing three houses -- the McCaul's, Shirley's, and the Perkey's -- to be evacuated by the police. The BWHCC fence on Wakefield was severely damaged, but fortunately the trees fell toward the pool and away from the houses. Two medium sized trees (8 to 10 inches in trunk diameter) on the club property between Wakefield and the pool will need to be removed because they were

struck and damaged by the much larger trees that fell. Sadly, one of the damaged trees is a mature Dogwood that will be missed.

Over the years we have lost several large street trees every year primarily in Spring or Fall storms. Because they were planted in the thin strips of property between the streets and the sidewalks, many have compromised root structures. The street trees have been a unique and defining characteristic of our neighborhood since the beginning with most of the trees dating back to the 1920's or 1930's, making the Water Oaks over 90 years old. The life expectancy of these trees when planted in areas where their roots can develop in a normal fashion could be well in excess of 100 years.



However, while our historic tree lined streets have been a cornerstone of the neighborhood, the original plan was flawed as the developer planted a single variety of tree (all water oaks) at the same time. The single species has a single life expectancy so the trees are all dying / falling around the same time. Modern urban forestry strategy would suggest a continual planting program that does some planting every year (as opposed to planting at one time with no renewal for many years) and planting a variety of species that have different final life expectancies. The neighborhood has been doing this for the last twenty years, literally planting hundreds of tree replacements, but inevitably we will see a "gap" in the maturity of our canopy with fewer and fewer trees over twenty years old in the neighborhood – especially at the street and in our front yards.



### Improved Path on Green Space Coming Soon

The Brookwood Hills Community Club has approved the creation of a path through the green space behind some of the homes on Huntington Road. The new path will largely follow the existing path on the Club's property. Brookwood Hills residents will be able to better enjoy one of our most beautiful neighborhood amenities — the 50+ acre urban green space. The decision to create this path is the culmination of more than two years of work and deliberation by the Clear Creek Committee, a committee made up of several Brookwood Hills residents.

Trail Design Specialists, a nationally known trail design firm, will create this new path. The path will improve drainage, improve access for walkers, and ensure that city vehicles will continue to have access to the sewage pipes without destroying the trail. Work is scheduled to begin early this summer and should last approximately four weeks. Because this is to be a nature friendly, unpaved path, heavy equipment will not be used. Access to the trail will be through the entrance at the bottom of Palisades and the entrance on the lot owned by the Club on Huntington (by the swing). For details on the trail location, please see the drawing by Alex Summers on the following page. The actual path is currently marked with blue flags.

The Board recognizes that some residents may have concerns. Among those concerns are noise and unauthorized use of the trail. With respect to noise, we assure you that the trail will not be used by motorized vehicles, and will probably be inappropriate even for bicycles. We do not anticipate that unauthorized use will be a problem. The issue of vagrants occupying the green space has been abated, largely a result of the Board's invasive species clearing project. The "opening up" of the space has discouraged the kind of urban camping experienced in the past. Furthermore, this trail is on private Club property for use by Club members only. We will be working on signage to that effect.



If you have been down to the Brookwood Hills Nature Preserve recently, you may have noticed an abundance of yellow flowers. With the help of Kay Summers and a book her mother had on wildflowers, we have identified the yellow flower as Wild Black Mustard (Brassica nigra). According to our resources, this flower is a weed that is "famous" for its sharp, spicy seeds which have been made into a spread and eaten with frankfurters. The flower, in plaster form, has also been applied to the chest as an old-fashioned cold remedy. 


