GOOD MORNING BROOKWOOD!



Maybe you've heard them called the Roosters, or the Magpies, or the Steamrollers. Or maybe you've just heard them. After spending 45 minutes walking with them, I would call them the Cheetahs, the fastest creatures in Brookwood Hills. Who are they?

They are Jane Jeter, Martha Dunlevie, Nancy Sample, Elizabeth Nadal, Barbara Slick and Eleanor Banister, a group of women who walk between three and four miles every weekday morning, beginning at 6:00 a.m. We're not talking about the lumbering along kind of walking —they really walk, really fast.

Camden resident, does not set her alarm clock in the Spring and Fall. She simply knows that when the Roosters pass her house, it is 6:30 and time to wake the kids for school.

The Roosters talk about current events and kids and families and schools and houses and whatever else happens to come up at 6:00 a.m. Indeed, they know each other best by their voices. At one neighborhood party, Eleanor Banister and Nancy Sample, who had been walking together for over six months, did not

recognize each other until they started talking. Along the way they pass early morning dog-walkers, dead possums, and downed trees, all the while never missing a beat.

By 7:00, they have walked the neighborhood, gotten their cardio work-out, and had lots of laughs ("We think we're really funny," says Jane Jeter). Anyone can join the Roosters on their morning jaunts, as long as he or she can walk fast enough to keep Barbara Slick in sight as she races up Brighton.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

On Tuesday, August 15th, I spoke with Webster Pope, Chairman of the Fulton County Board of Assessors. The mailing of property tax bills has been delayed for those of us who filed appeals of our 1995 valuations. While unappealed property tax bills were mailed several weeks ago, those under protest will not be mailed until the end of this week or next -- perhaps as late as August 25th. According to Mr. Pope, the delay was caused by the need to refigure the tax bills for these properties. When the bills arrive, they will be based on the 1994 assessment figures. They will be due 45 days from the date of the bill.

Mr. Pope stated that appeals will not begin to be heard until the end of this year. The delay is because the Board is still dealing with 1994 appeals. Once an appeal is resolved, the County will then bill the property owner for any difference between the 1994-based payment and the final 1995-based figure Mr. Pope said that because of the volume of appeals coming from our neighborhood, the Board had "conducted a careful review" of the 1995 Brookwood Hills assessments. He stated that after reviewing the 1993 and 1994 sales figures for approximately 50 Brookwood Hills properties, the Board is standing behind the assessed values which we received in May.


' If you have missed "The Barry Miller Show" at the annual meeting of the Community Club, you have missed one of the highlights of living in Brookwood Hills. Sergeant Barry Miller, Sr. is an Atlanta motorcycle policeman who serves off-duty as the head of the Brookwood Hills security patrol. His annual reports to the neighborhood reflect the man-humorous, intelligent, warm and kind, but tough when he needs to be.

In 1979, Brookwood Hills suffered 35 break-ins, and the need for greater security protection was on everyone's mind. It was fortuitous (at least in retrospect), that Brookwood resident Dr. Linton Hopkins happened to find himself stopped at a road block in Peachtree Hills. The officer who stopped him was Barry Miller, who pointed out that Dr. Hopkins had an expired driver's license and an expired inspection sticker. Whether it was quick thinking or just a diversionary tactic, Dr. Hopkins asked Barry if he would be interested in working off-duty for the neighborhood. Barry agreed, but still gave Dr. Hopkins the tickets.

On his first night on the job. Barry caught the burglar responsible for the break-ins, who tried to claim that he "was on his way home from Underground." The burglar was locked up promptly and Barry has


been here ever since. Since he was hired, the number of break-ins have fallen dramatically.

There is a great camaraderie between father and son -- Barry, Jr. says with a smile that it was great working with his dad on the police force "until Dad made Sergeant" this past January. The first call Barry, Jr. received when he joined the police force was to bring a paddy wagon to a crime scene. When Barry, Jr. arrived, there was his dad with the crack dealer. It's hard to say which Barry was more surprised to see the other. Since then, Barry, Jr. has won the Medal of Honor for courage in the line of duty.

The off-duty security patrol works eight shifts a week, both day

and night. In addition, they monitor the police radio, investigating any reports from Brookwood Hills. According to Barry, Sr. anyone who comes into this neighborhood either lives here, is visiting, is lost, or is bad. Barry therefore encourages residents to call 911 if they see anyone suspicious.

The Barrys encourage residents to help prevent crime--by keeping garage doors closed, bikes locked up, and valuables out of the car. Also, if there is nothing valuable in your car, Barry, Sr. suggests that you leave it unlocked, so that your windows won't get broken.

The Variegated Look

Ten years ago sophisticated American gardeners were apt to frown upon variegated plants. Such plants were considered garish. They made the garden look too "busy" and distracted from the overall design. Many of the more often-used variegated plants were considered ordinary--hardly the stuff of the finest gardens.

What a difference ten years makes! Now variegated plants are "in." The plants haven't changed, but now we gardeners see them as having greater merit. Their variegated foliage lights up dark corners of the garden and makes other plants around them look better. And for plant collectors, it is almost enough that they are "different." (You know, if everyone else has green sedum, the plant collector will prefer the green and white variegated form.)

Variegated plants are naturally less vigorous than their green counterparts because they have less chlorophyll. But many of them grow very well in Atlanta despite this.

For those of us in Brookwood Hills who tend to garden in shade, there are some great choices among variegated plants. A short list of my favorites for shade will have to include:

- Variegated Solomon's Seal (<u>Polygonum odoratum 'Variegated</u>') has green leaves edged in white, arching stems, and excellent fall foliage.
- All the pulmonarias (lungwort) have gray green evergreen leaves that appear spattered with white paint.
- Variegated ajugas (some are gray and white; 'Burgandy Glow' is gray, purple, pink, and white!)
- Japanese painted fern (Athyrium nipponicum 'Pictum') sports lacy, soft fronds of gray, green and purple.
- Variegated hostas number in the hundreds, but two of the best are 'Francee' and 'Kabitan.'
- Variegated sedge (<u>Carex morrowii 'Variegata</u>') is a spectacular swirl of cream and green stripes, useful for sun or shade.
- Wariegated hydrangea (<u>Hydrangea macrophylla 'Variegata</u>') is a lacecap form with leaves edged in white.
- Variegated kerria (Kerria japonica 'Picta') also has leaves edged in white and single yellow blooms in spring.

For those of you with some sun, these are spectacular:

- Striped maidengrass (Miscanthus sinensis 'Morning Light') is perfect for small gardens.
- Variegated sweet iris (<u>Iris pallida 'Albo-variegata</u>') has cream streaks on green upright foliage.
- Variegated sedum (Sedum alboroseum 'Medio-variegatus') grows like Sedum 'Autumn Joy,' but has a creamy center in each leaf.
- Yucca 'Bright Edge' is a small yucca with leaves edged in creamy gold. It's great in a pot!

All these plants are easy to grow. (I promise.) The real challenge is to find them in the trade, but they're worth the search!

9&Under Boys. Scott Elliott - 1 meter (10th)


10-11 Girls, Julia Goode - 1 meter (7th), 3 meter (3rd) Amelia Williams - 1 meter (11th)
