Brookwood Hills neighbors Linda Copeland and Esther Stokes serve on the Board of the Cherokee Garden Library which will be hosting *Nature's Beloved Son: Rediscovering John Muir's Botanical Legacy* from October 12-December 4, 2011 in the gallery space in McElreath Hall at the Atlanta History Center.

The exhibit is an extraordinary opportunity to learn about an amazing man who contributed significantly to the American appreciation of our magnificent natural beauty. The exhibit explores Muir's love of botany, which formed the underpinnings of his life's work in conservation and preservation of the great outdoors. *Nature's Beloved Son* is traveling to museums, botanical gardens, and parks throughout North America and will appeal to a wide range of visitors including people interested in botany, history, ecology, environmentalism, John Muir himself, the history of science, and art. Through the beauty of botany visitors are asked how nature might inspire them as it did John Muir so profoundly and reflect on the status of the biodiversity of plants in today's world. The Cherokee Garden Library will be the *only* Southeastern venue for *Nature's Beloved Son*.



Brookwood Hills' Wright Caughman Named One of "Atlanta's Most Influential People"

In June the *Atlanta Business Chronicle* published its annual special section profiling "Atlanta's 100 Most Influential People," as selected by the paper's editors. The 2011 list includes BWH resident Wright Caughman, who serves as Executive Vice President for Health Affairs at Emory University. In that capacity Wright is responsible for overseeing the 5 major units of the Woodruff Health Sciences Center at Emory: the School of Medicine, the School of Nursing, the School of Public Health, the Yerkes Primate Center, and Emory Healthcare.

When Wright came to Atlanta and Brookwood Hills 21 years ago, becoming an executive at Emory was the last thing on his mind. After graduating from Davidson College in 1970 and a stint in the army, Wright was an English teacher at the public high school he had attended in Columbia, SC. He met and married Alison, who was a math teacher there. "It was the hardest job I ever had in my



life," says Wright. "I have incredible respect for those who have dedicated their lives to teaching our children. I decided I had to do something easier and so I opted for medical school." After 5 years in Charleston for medical school and an internship the Wright spent 3 years in Boston at Harvard, training to become a dermatologist. "Most everyone else in my residency group went into private practice," says Wright, "but I decided to give research a try." So the next stop was 7 years in Bethesda, Maryland at the National Institutes of Health, where he became an accomplished researcher and scientist with expertise in molecular biology and immunology.

By this time Wright and Alison had 3 children, Shirah, Stewart and Chris and they felt there were better places than Washington DC for raising a family. When in 1990 Emory offered Wright a position, he jumped at the chance. "Working in an academic setting was perfect for me," Wright explains. "Emory afforded me the chance to pursue scientific discovery, while at the same time teaching and interacting with bright young students and residents and providing patient care." In 1997 Wright was tapped to chair the Dermatology Department and discovered a new interest: the business of healthcare and how to sustain academic medicine in a rapidly changing economic environment. In 2004 he was named Director of The Emory Clinic, and then a year ago he moved into his current position. "I still see patients on a regular basis," states Wright, "which as a dermatologist it is possible to do. It would be another matter if I were a neurosurgeon. But I find it extremely helpful to me in my management position to regularly interact with our patients, which after all are why the Emory medical enterprise exists. And I enjoy collegial interaction with fellow physicians, residents, students and staff. I absolutely love my job."

Wright doesn't have much spare time, but his alternate passion is golf and he tries to play at least a few times a month. BWH resident Danny McCaul is a regular golfing partner and says with a smile, "Wright's influence also extends to the golf course. His enviable skill with the clubs has influenced me to either take lessons or stop betting against him. He can be merciless!"

"Actually," says Wright, "golf is the ideal vehicle for perfecting the virtue of humility, which is quite useful to me in my day job."




