

NEW TREES TAKE ROOT



On the morning of December 9, forty-eight trees arrived in Brookwood Hills ready to be planted as part of the neighborhood reforestation program organized by the Community Club and funded by the Garden Club auction proceeds. Headed by Celeste Porter, Tree Chairman of the BWH Community Club, the reforestation program is the culmination of nearly two years of planning and hard work.


The Committee began with a survey of each existing tree in the neighborhood, conducted by Arborguard Tree Specialists. The Committee then consulted with various arborists and landscape designers who discouraged planting under utility wires and who recommended planting a variety of trees.

After consulting with experts, five varieties of trees

were chosen as best suited for planting in an urban "stress" area such as our neighborhood, including three types of canopy trees (Allee Elms, Nuttal Oaks and October Glory Maples) and two types of smaller trees for planting under utility wires (Trident Maples and Cherokee Princess Dogwoods). The trees were supplied by one of the premier commercial nurseries in the state, Bold Spring Nursery, which is owned by John Barbour, a former Brighton Road resident. To give the trees an extra boost, the soil was amended with Nature's Helper and Tree Saver, or mycorrhizae fungi. The trees were then topped with hardwood mulch to conserve water. Gunn Landscaping was the contractor who planted the trees in a timely and efficient manner.

Although the new trees were available to all residents, The Committee particularly encouraged neighbors who had lost trees as a result of Opal to replant. Where utility wires provided a site conflict, neighbors were asked to plant trees inside the edges of their yards. Some BWH residents were so delighted with the planting that they added trees on their property at their own expense. All recipients made a commitment to water and care for their new trees.

Celeste was assisted in the reforestation program by Committee members Betsy Robinson, Katrina Newton and Betsy Crosby, as well as by former Tree Committee Chairmen JoAnn Hagaman and Rob Donovan. The Committee hopes that the reforestation efforts will continue on an annual basis in the years to come. Many thanks to all who have made this year's planting such a success. When you see this year's Tree Chairman Celeste Porter on the street, please give her your special thanks.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

This month we can all take pleasure in seeing the neighborhood reforestation efforts bear fruit. Forty-eight trees were planted in the sidewalk green space or on the edge of yards during the week of December 9 in an effort to make up for some of the losses we have suffered in Opal and throughout the last few years.

The disappearance of our mature trees is a serious concern to all neighbors. Over 95% of the trees in Brookwood Hills over 26 inches in diameter are Water Oaks that were planted when the neighborhood was developed in the late 1920s and early '30s. The sobering fact is that the days are numbered for many of these trees, which are rapidly succumbing to natural forces, such as disease, high winds and pollution.

Though we can begrudgingly accept the death of a tree from causes outside our control, it is particularly galling to see a tree destroyed by manmade forces. Last year, we watched as crews from Atlanta Gas dug trenches in the streets immediately in front of several large trees. At least three of these trees went into immediate decline and had to be removed. This fall a Georgia Power crew radically pruned a number of neighborhood trees in a manner that has undermined the health of those trees. And most recently, a Public Works subcontractor from the City of Atlanta went beyond the scope of his work order and cut the roots of one of our more majestic older trees in order to install a uniform new curb. The tree will have to be removed as a result.

Ironically, the neighborhood watchdogs had warned each of these entities not to injure these trees in the course of performing their work. Those warnings were met by assurances from these companies that they would exercise due care. As usual, these proved to be empty promises. We have made our dissatisfaction known and are negotiating with the City of Atlanta for some replacement trees as a result. In response to our demands, Georgia Power has donated a Trident Maple to our reforestation program. Unfortunately, there is no satisfactory replacement for a magnificent 80-foot tree butchered out of negligence and lack of concern.

There are few options available to us. Educating the appropriate representatives of these entities to the need to protect these trees is one approach that must be repeated every year, though such education rarely gets communicated to the crews doing their work. Drafting legislation that would create fines for government entities who injure public trees is another option, one that several tree-loving neighbors hope to explore in the coming months. The best option, however, is to keep planting trees, year after year after year. Please do all you can to continue the neighborhood replanting efforts, either by planting a large shade tree in your own yard, accepting a neighborhood tree, or by contributing to future tree-planting funds.


SECURITY ALERT
