

Report From Clear Creek

About a year ago BWHCC initiated a major step in halting the decline of forest cover by beginning reforestation in the Clear Creek Nature Preserve. A seven-year invasive plant control contract with Terry Sutton of Cascade Forestry was launched and already it has produced astounding results. Kudzu is getting under control, English ivy, wisteria and other invasive climbing vines are disappearing from the large trees, and privet, perhaps the most noxious invasive known to mankind, has been cut and treated to the extent that some natural re-growth of pines, maples, oaks, sycamores, and poplars is taking place where privet previously ruled.



On November 15th, in conjunction with the 5th annual tree replacement program in the neighborhood, Trees Atlanta, under the direction of Susan Pierce, made available 10 Virginia Pines and 5 Loblolly Pines for planting on the high ground of the Clear Creek Nature Preserve along Clayton Drive in the Armour Industrial Area. The planting was accomplished with the expert help of Lu Anne Schwarz, Hilary Nichols, Jamie Blackburn (at left, with Alex Summers offering advice), Kathryn Masuda, Amanda Campbell, Coleen Dudley, Andres Rincon, Sr. and son, Andres, Jr.: all volunteers from the staff of the Atlanta Botanical Garden. Independent volunteers Chris Ewald and

Mike Snyder helped as well. This new line of evergreens should increase the screening of the industrial area from Huntington as well as provide increased forest cover along Clayton Drive. Chip Cheatham of Pierce-Martin Inc. and Glen Murer of Atlantel Inc. and Mason Murer Galleries are allowing us use of their water to nourish the trees during the drought.

In October, the Brookwood Hills Board allocated funds for a planting which took place on December 7th of an additional 30 Virginia Pines and for the installation of protective landscape boulders along Armour Drive. This will extend the neighborhood screening behind 245 and 275 Camden Road, along an open area across the creek in front of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution Building, White Cap Construction Supply and a portion of Westminster Inc., and will supplement the neighborhood's 2000-2001 planting of Nellie R. Stevens Hollies to the east.

With the continued support from the Community Club Board and neighborhood participation, we should, in the course of time, be able to create an enviable nature preserve right in our own back yard.

Tennis Court Improvements

Earlier this year, a group of BWHCC members were asked by the Board to investigate different options to improve the tennis courts in the neighborhood. This group included Lee King, Alan Simons, Jack Heisel, Alex Doman, Dan Granot, Margaret Mertens, Harvey Ross and John Mulcahy. Certain priorities emerged as the group discussed options, including quality and longevity, an upscale look, and a surface that requires little or no maintenance while being easier on knees and joints. Many alternatives were considered, from patching the existing asphalt to installing clay. The group contacted manufacturers and installers, visited local facilities, and questioned players and maintenance personnel. In the end, the group recommended at the November Board meeting that Rebound Ace be installed. This recommendation was approved and Signature Tennis has been contracted to install the courts.

Rebound Ace is a cushioned hard court surface that will be installed on top of the existing asphalt courts. It is comprised of a high density/high shock-absorbing rubber combined with a multilayer acrylic coating. It was the official surface of the Australian Open from 1988 to 2007 and was used during the 2000 Summer Olympic Games in Sydney. It is in use in several locations in the Atlanta area, including the PGA Tour Superstore on Garson Drive.

Funds from the conservation easement agreement on the Clear Creek property will be utilized to pay for the new surface, in keeping with the requirement that the money be spent on capital improvements to the community club in order to remain tax-free. It is expected that installation will occur shortly after April 27th in consideration of the pavilion construction schedule and the Spring ALTA season.

Club Renovation Project Kicks Off

After a year of planning, the club renovation finally commenced on Monday, November 24th. We're very excited about the renovation and believe it will boost the enjoyment of our club. Some highlights of what will be happening over the next few months are:

Bathrooms

The pool bathrooms will undergo a complete renovation. They will be expanded by 500 square feet, 4 showers stalls will be added to both the men's and women's bathrooms, the countertops and plumbing fixtures will be replaced, and new tile will be installed throughout. The men's and women's bathrooms at the park will also get new tile, counter tops, and plumbing fixtures.

Pool

New pool gutters will be installed in the pool. They will provide enhanced water flow in and out of the pool and will create cleaner water for swimming. The current bulkhead will be expanded by two feet in width and three to four feet in length, allowing us to widen the swimming lanes to seven feet. We will also drain the pool so we may plaster and seal the pool bottom, ensuring that it stays water tight.

Tennis Courts

For a description of the tennis court renovation see the article by John Mulcahy on page 2 which details how the Brookwood Hills tennis courts will become among the best in Atlanta.

The renovation for the bathrooms and pool are scheduled for completion on March 22nd. The tennis court resurfacing will begin in late April and will take approximately three weeks to complete. Our current tennis courts will be available throughout the duration of the bathroom and pool projects.

The Brookwood Hills Board will send out periodic communications on the status and schedule of the project. We hope you are as excited as we are for these improvements to our club, funded with the proceeds from the Clear Creek easement agreement with the City of Atlanta. See you this summer!




Mary Brooks Perkey and Courtney White pose for the camera while trick-or-treating.
