

Community Club and Garden Club to Sponsor Neighborhood Book

This past spring I was asked to write a short piece for *Brooknotes* about the Garden Club Auction's theme—a Celebration of the 90th Anniversary of the Founding of Brookwood Hills in 1922. The project led me to reread the histories compiled by our neighborhood Elaine Luxemburger, along with some articles we'd coauthored for *Brooknotes* in the 1990s. I then decided to explore the Legacy Project files at the Atlanta History Center, three boxes of historic material gathered from past and current residents by the Brookwood Hills Legacy Ladies in 2009. I thought to myself, "What a great story. Somebody should write a book."

On November 20, 2012, Elaine Luxemburger and I signed a contract with Arcadia Publishing Company to produce the book entitled *Brookwood Hills* for its "Images of America" series. Arcadia is the leading local history publisher in the United States, with a catalog of more than 7,500 titles in print, including books on Inman Park, Grant Park, Buckhead, Sandy Springs, Avondale Estates, and Marietta, to name a few. Instead of "coffee table" books with color photos, the series uses approximately 200 vintage photographs in black

and white with extensive captions in a photo essay format. We believe that this format will make a book about our neighborhood's significance timeless, accessible to all ages, and fun to read for years to come. Arcadia books are respected as carefully documented histories, and as such can be found on the shelves of many libraries. They are printed on environmentally certified paper, and are also available in an E-book format.

The Brookwood Hills Community Club and the Brookwood Hills Garden Club have generously agreed to underwrite the publication costs of the book, which we hope will be published by December 2013 in recognition of the 75th anniversaries of the Garden Club (2013) and the Community Club (2014). We also look forward to letting a wider audience in Atlanta-- and across the country-- know how our green, walkable neighborhood can be viewed as a model for healthy living and sustainable community design.

Our book will tell about the early Native Americans in our area, the Civil War Battle that raged across our borders, and the fashionable homes that once lined this section of Peachtree Road. Our primary focus, however, will be how this streetcar suburb retained its character, architectural integrity, greenspace and community vitality in

the face of enormous urban pressures, while staying very much a part of the City of Atlanta.

Please help us tell this story by combing your files, your scrapbooks and your photo albums for pictures and other documents that illustrate our neighborhood's history. Let us know about anything you think might be important. (That picture of your son in the front yard might offer a great illustration of our street tree canopy at its height.) While Arcadia prefers that the majority of photos pre-date 1980, we will also include a few more recent pictures, especially those of major events such as Hurricane Opal and the opening of the Clear Creek Nature Trail. We need pictures of life at the pool and park, street parties, play groups, neighborhood clubs, Halloween, Fourth of July, Christmas activities, the Peachtree Road Race (especially the early days), block parties, Community Club meetings, tree plantings, Christmas tree recycling, the New Camden flood, Officer Barry and his men, maps, vintage pictures of houses and early street scenes of our section of Peachtree Road. We're particularly interested in photos of "Brookwood Hills Heroes"—those who have had a significant impact on our neighborhood, and also pictures and stories of residents important to the history of Atlanta. We can even include photos of memorabilia and graphics from scrapbooks.

We are looking for nearly any type of image: whether tiny, or large; pasted to an album page, or loose; in color, or black and white; printed film, slide or negative; faded and of poor quality, or easily readable. The Arcadia staff stands ready to help restore and sharpen these images to their best quality, and can transform color pictures into black and white.

We ask you to allow us to copy the original images ourselves with our scanning equipment in order to meet the publisher's reproduction requirements. We can bring our scanner to you, so you do not have to part with your original pictures, and can even scan a photo pasted in an album. If you have contact information for other early residents (or their descendants) who might also be able to contribute, please share that with us as well.

Saltyard Restaurant Coming to the Brookwood

The new *Saltyard* Restaurant, owned by Christian Favalli and Kristy Jones-Favalli, is scheduled to open in the spring of 2013 in the Brookwood condominium building, across Peachtree Street from Brookwood Hills. *Saltyard* is designed by Square Feet Studios, and will feature plush banquettes, wood rafters, an open kitchen and industrial accents, as well as a patio facing Peachtree Road.

"We strive to make the human connection between what is on the plate and in the glass, between the long-standing relationships between friends, farms, artisanal purveyors and our Atlanta neighbors."

Saltyard's hours will be Monday through Thursday, 5 to 10 p.m., Friday and Saturday 5 - 11 p.m. and Sunday, 5 - 9 p.m.


In addition to the yearly maintenance, Brookwood Hills has several upcoming projects for the Preserve. Really, work in the Preserve is never complete. This winter we will be planting thirteen new hardwoods along the trail. We will also be cleaning up a notoriously rough area of the Preserve along Clayton Drive in the Armour Drive Industrial Area and planting pine trees for screening. Did you know that Brookwood Hills is the largest landowner in the Armour Drive Industrial Drive area? Over the course of many years, the neighborhood has worked to keep our property clean of illegal dumping. Part of these efforts include planting a natural screen between the businesses and the neighborhood. The work this winter will add to this screening. Finally, in 2013, we hope to improve the entrance to the trail at Palisades and continue our invasive species efforts (the Japanese hops and kudzu will not defeat us!).

It has been wonderful to see neighbors out at the trail. As always, if you see anything of concern in the Preserve, please let a board member know.
