A Letter from the President

Thanks to all who attended the Association's Annual Meeting on February 6th in the Rich Auditorium at Piedmont Hospital. Officer Barry Miller gave the annual (and famous) "state of security" address (it was surprisingly good news), and Atlanta City Council member Lee Morris presented his perspective on several issues important to the neighborhood. While not all the news from City Hall is good, it is encouraging to find that we will have access to our Council Representative. As a sign of extraordinary good will, Lee gave out both his office and home phone numbers (330-6050 and 231-4065 respectively), with the message that constituents are welcome to call. We also had an opportunity to thank retiring President Lee Robinson and Secretary Harrilee Molm, as well as Thornton DeRosa, Pat Leake, Steve Parker, and Esther Stokes, Board Members whose terms expired this year. If you have not had the opportunity to do so, I hope you will find time to thank these neighbors who have worked very hard on our behalf.

At the meeting we also discussed trends in Association membership and the impact of the pool and tennis facility on the budget. In each of the past four years "A", "C" and "D" membership has declined by 2-4%. ("A" members are Brookwood Hills residents who use the pool and tennis courts. "B" members are residents who do not use those facilities. "C" members are non-BWH residents who use the pool and tennis courts. "D" members are non-residents who use the pool only.) Over the same four year period, Association expenses have increased, with an explosive surge in the property tax burden expected this year. The Board has responded to this situation by increasing dues for "A" and "B" members for 1994. "A" member dues will be increased from \$455 to \$495. "B" member dues will increase from \$160 to \$180.

The Association allocates well over \$100,000 each year for neighborhood services such as buffer property maintenance and taxes, professional fees (largely for zoning issues), beautification projects, and private security patrols. In the past, the dues from "C" and "D" members was sufficient not only to support the pool and tennis courts, but also to underwrite some of these neighborhood services. Unfortunately, while the pool and tennis courts remain self-supporting, the days of non-resident dues supporting resident services are essentially over. While it is encouraging that approximately 80% of Brookwood Hills residents are already members of the Association, now more than ever we need the full support of each neighbor as a member, in order to stop the cycle of having to choose between an increase in dues or a reduction in services.

If you are already a member of the Association, I hope you will be able to continue to support its work. If you are a new resident, or if you are not currently an Association member and would like to know more about why membership is so important, please contact me or any other Board member for more information. When you receive your membership materials next month, take a few minutes to remind yourself of all the things the Association does to improve our quality of life and to support Brookwood Hills property values. I am sure if you do, it will be easy to respond positively to this membership drive.

First, officials in the City Sanitation (and Rat Eradication) Department advise <u>not</u> to put out seed and suet for birds, as suggested in the issue under Garden Tips. Birdseed, along with pet food, are major culprits in new complaints of rats, especially in Buckhead.

Second, I discovered that the popular drinking water I've used for two years is actually recycled municipal water, that is, filtered. I have researched several sources and recommend <u>Lipsey</u> drinking water, also used at CDC for drinking and for experimentation! I welcome any calls on the subject (876-8339).

February Cultivations

From the Garden Club

Although one may continue to plan the garden in February, there are still a few chores to do around the grounds. So put on your Wellies and button up your Mack -- let's tidy up and get a head start on Spring. For the industrious, annual and vegetable seeds can be started indoors. Pansies and violas can be set outdoors. Evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees may still be planted. Add a little seed to those worn spots in the lawn. Refurbish your soil with manure and organic matter. Feed broadleaf evergreens and flowering shrubs.

February is the month to prune fruit trees and crepe myrtles. It really isn't necessary to prune these crepe myrtles severely. Their natural growth pattern is quite exceptional. A nip here and a tuck there will suffice.

Do not prune needle-like shrubs. Cut all dead wood off shrubs and trees. Reduce hydrangeas by three fourths of the growth.

A note about pruning tools: an arsenal is not really necessary except for the most avid gardener. For light pruning, scissor action hand pruners offer a clean cut in tight areas. The anvil blade pruners are used for slightly larger branches. Remember these clippers are meant for one handed action. Using two hands and squeezing with the strength of Willie B. while beads of sweat form small streams on your face only pops the clippers and keeps the manufacturers in business. Before buying these clippers, take several varieties off the shelf and grasp them until you find a comfortable fit. Then buy the next size larger.

Heavier pruning chores (i.e. dogwoods and crabapple branches) are best handled with *loppers*. They come in scissor and anvil blade types also. Pick good wood or steel handles for ease and longevity. Again, don't tackle anything too large for this tool.

The third necessary tool is the *pruning saw*. A carpenter's saw works on the push, so sawing a limb with this is an uphill nightmare. The pruning saw works on the pull, so the weight of the hands and arm do all the work. Keep it clean, well oiled, and sharp.

Invest in hedge shears, pole pruners, and other pruning tools when you need them.


