A Letter from the President

The map on page three of this edition of <u>Brooknotes</u> is not a quiz on the makeup of the former Republic of Yugoslavia! But how many of you looking at it recognize the shaded area of the buffer property, owned by the neighborhood Association, that protects us from development on our southern and eastern borders? In addition to the park area, the neighborhood owns six parcels of taxable property (roughly 25 acres) that contribute to the forest-like atmosphere of the neighborhood. This buffer is one of the many things that make Brookwood Hills a unique place to live, yet we tend to take it for granted. Can you imagine the neighborhood without it? In 1994 the neighborhood Association must budget over forty thousand dollars simply for the maintenance of this property. These funds, which come from your dues to the Association, will underwrite the anticipated cost of 1994 property taxes, tree removal, and capital costs directly associated with this property. While we hope that our appeals to lower the greatly increased property assessments will be successful and that no trees will fall on fences this year, our budget must reflect the facts as we know them today. Clearly, we need every resident's participation as a member of the Association to meet this financial challenge.

Unfortunately, this is by no means the only financial issue our neighborhood faces in 1994. Security, zoning, parking, and general maintenance issues loom large, and will require significant human and financial resources. All this will directly impact Association dues, and may ultimately require a cut-back in the number of services the Association can provide to the neighborhood. If you are a new neighbor who would like to know more about the activities of the neighborhood Association, or an "old" neighbor who would like to get caught up on the issues we face, I invite you to attend the Association's Annual Meeting at 7:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 6th, in the Rich Auditorium at Piedmont Hospital. We plan to review the Association's major programs, our 1994 budget, and other significant issues for our neighborhood. We will also elect a new slate of officers for 1994 and seven new Board members. I hope you will come away with an understanding of how important it is for every property owner in Brookwood Hills to support the Association through membership (as an A member if at all possible), and the effort it will take to keep this the special place we all love. I hope to see you there. We need your interest and input!

Garden Club Tips

January is the month to plan a wonderful garden. Curl up in front of a nice fire with all your seed catalogues. Order at least one outrageous perennial, vine or border plant. Have fun with your garden planning. Gardens should be enjoyable to you as well as your neighbors.

All shrubs may be moved or newly planted during the dormant period. Prune deciduous trees. Plant something for the birds so that they will be there to eat your bugs next summer.

Winter tip: If it snows, you can shake or brush heavy snow off branches before it freezes. Never remove ice from the branches because it will damage the tree or shrub.

Give your house plants some attention. One recommendation is to feed them regularly on a twelve month basis. For flowering plants, a 5-10-10 formula is good. For foliage plants 12-6-6 can be used. Lowering night time temperature by ten degrees helps house plants retain more moisture because less evaporates. This retained moisture is used in the plant's building blocks, creating larger leaves. Plants that are cool do not grow as fast, so they have stronger stems. In general they are stockier, fatter, and fuller. African violets are one of the exceptions, as they want to be toasty all the time.


