Mayor Grants Liquor License

The neighborhood Association has, for many months, been opposing the attempt to open a large, late-night club called Cafe Reggio, on the site formerly occupied by Zazu's at 1923 Peachtree Road. The grounds for the neighborhood's opposition included the facts that there is no adequate parking to accommodate the crowds the club is expected to draw, and the owners of the club do not meet the requirements stipulated by law for receipt of a liquor license.

The Association only recently learned that, with no public announcement, Mayor Jackson granted a liquor license to Reggio's owners, Swails and Associates, Inc. The license issued by the Mayor overturned the recommendation for denial of a license by the Liquor License Review Board earlier this year. Immediately upon learning of the Mayor's action, the Board asked him to reconsider this decision. To date, no final determination has been made by the Mayor. The Board has voted to initiate legal action, if necessary, to prevent the opening of this establishment as it is currently planned.

Tax Bill Alert

According to the Atlanta Journal, the first wave of Atlanta/Fulton County property tax bills was mailed July 14th. The last set of bills should be in the mail by July 23rd. Property owners who are in the process of appealing their assessments will receive estimated bills based on their 1992 assessed value or the value asked for in their appeal, whichever number is higher. Property owners who did not appeal will be billed according to their new assessed value. The Atlanta city taxes will be due August 15th. The Fulton County portion of the bill will be due October 15th.

It's the Law

The State of Georgia recently enacted legislation that affects all children under the age of 16 who ride bicycles. Children who are four years old or younger and passengers on a bicycle must be helmeted and seated in an appropriate bicycle seat or infant sling. Children operating their own bikes (including those with training wheels) must wear a helmet, even if they are only riding on the sidewalk or a bicycle path. The helmet must meet or exceed the guidelines set by either the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) or the Snell Memorial Foundation. It must fit securely and be strapped in place.

Since most of us grew up riding our bikes without helmets, this may seem like another instance of government over-regulation. However, there is a substantial body of evidence now available that helmets can make a significant difference in the number and severity of head injuries suffered by cyclists (both adults and children) involved in accidents. Serious injuries are not necessarily caused by a collision with a car. Simply sliding on wet leaves or catching a tire on a rock can cause a bad spill. Please require your children to use a good helmet. If they complain, you can use the excuse: It's the law!

Stop Please

Neighbors living near the corner of Huntington and Wakefield by the entrance to the pool have observed that few cars entering the intersection come to a full stop at any of the three stop signs. Most of the year, this is not usually a big problem. In the summer however, when the pool is open, the intersection can be quite congested and the danger of hitting a child darting out into the street is heightened. Your cooperation in coming to a full stop and proceeding cautiously is appreciated.

Tree Watch

In the last ten years, Brookwood Hills has replaced many trees as older ones have died. Trees that were planted three to five years ago now need to be pruned so that they can coexist with the power lines. Georgia Power subcontractors, who trim the trees every two years, will be re-entering the neighborhood this summer to do this pruning. We as homeowners have a role to play in this: we must be educated consumers. In the next few weeks, each household will receive a booklet, specifically designed for Brookwood Hills, to serve as a guide for homeowners and Georgia Power subcontractors. It will explain exactly how the trees should be pruned so that the wires can be protected without decimating the beauty and symmetry of the trees. Please read this booklet carefully, and refer to it when Georgia Power subcontractors come to prune in front of your home.

In the meantime, in this hot weather don't forget your new willow oaks recently planted by the Garden Club, especially if your tree is in full sun all day. Trees less than two years old should be watered every five days, in the absence of a good soaking-type rain. Water your new tree thoroughly. This means twenty minutes with the hose (not the sprinkler). Wait five to ten minutes and water it again for another twenty minutes.

Swim Team Scores

The 1993 Brookwood Hills Swim Team crowned a highly successful season with its best finish in nine years at the Fulton County Championships on July 17th. Brookwood swimmers were terific, taking first place in seven relay events and thirteen individual events, the highest number of firsts for any team. There were many personal best times, despite the 98 degree heat and 10-hour meet. The team finished in second place behind Horseshoe Bend Country Club.

Brookwood set three new county records: in the 6 and under boys freestyle relay (Jason Wimberly, Robert Griest, Will Bryant, and Walker Owen), and in the 7-8 girls freestyle and medley relays (Lida Griest, Lisa Nowack, Caroline Owen, and Kelly Golson).

The 7-8 boys won both medley and freestyle relays (Spencer Hagaman, Andrew Jones, Watson Bryant, and Patrick Forquer); the 11-12 girls won the freestyle relay (Garland Askins, Audrey Boyer, Katie Golson, and Zibby Stokes); and the 15-18 girls won the freestyle relay (Jenny Foster, Alison Clineburg, Jenny Arnold, and Jessica Stokes).

Four swimmers won two events apiece: Watson Bryant (7-8 boys 25 free and 25 fly), Walker Owen (6 and under boys 25 free and 25 back), Caroline Owen (7-8 girls 100 individual medley and 25 fly), and Zibby Stokes (11-12 girls 100 IM and 50 fly). Also, Kelly Golson won the 7-8 girls 25 free, Lida Griest won the 7-8 girls 50 free, and Lisa Nowack won the 7-8 girls 25 breast. Katie Golson won the 11-12 girls 50 free, and event in which Brookwood finished 1-2-3. Michael Benham won the 11-12 boys 50 back.

Brookwood was coached this summer by head coach Topher McGibbon, assisted by Chad Cook and Jessica Stokes. The coaches were all smiles after the Fulton County meet, pleased that the team showed in their swims how much hard work they had put into practice. Leslie Benham served as head swim team mom, putting in countless hours of hard work in support of the team. She was ably assisted by Charlene Kenworthy and Mimi Stitt.

Happy Fourth




