POOL FLOODS, REOPENS FOR 4TH

All was not fun and games the weekend of July 4th. The destructive storm that hit the neighborhood on Friday, June 30th threatened to ruin the holiday for pool members."The park became Lake Brookwood and Lake Brookwood became part of the pool," said BWH Board member and Pool Committee Chairman Jim Porter, recalling the muddy mess that confronted him the morning of July

Thanks to the heroic efforts of manager Tom Stocks and his staff, however, the pool was clean and full of swimmers by 12:00 on July 3rd. Starting Saturday afternoon, and working into the wee hours of the night, Tom and his assistants Robert Withers, Matt Junger and Slade Striklan, managed to drain the muddy water, hose down the sides, and remove by hand the accumulation of mud in the drain so that the pool could be refilled.

On the night of the storm, Brookwood was pelted with two inches of rain in one hour. High winds helped to plug the storm drains on Parkdale with limbs and leaves, causing the overflow to pour into the park and down into the pool. Although

the pool fence caught much of the larger debris, the wind and water swept leaves, umbrellas and chairs into the pool with the mud.

The most tedious part, said Robert Withers, was waiting for the pool to drain: "It was a slow, long game, like watching paint dry." It wasn't until 12:45 a.m. that the team was able to climb into the pool to empty out the mud in the drain. Refilling the pool began at 1:30 a.m. Sunday morning.


To help while away the time, the boys played basketball and listened to music. Mothers Patti Junger and Debbie Striklan brought hamburgers and a cake. Tom Stokes spent the night to assure that all was well with the filling of the pool, visited frequently by Jim Porter.

Thanks to sunny weather, good organization and the creative addition of a dunking machine, the pool was mobbed with happy faces. Even those sunbathing parents with the dry bathing suits joined in on the neighborhood favorite, the WHIRLPOOL.

The Pet Parade



PROFILE:

Mary McCarty Dunlap

In the sixty-two years that Mary McCarty Dunlap has been a resident of Brookwood Hills, she has come to know first-hand the value of a close-knit community. Raising single-handedly her three sons following her divorce, she found that "everything was neighborhood."

"We had wonderful children up and down the street," said Mrs. Dunlap. Nearly all neighborhood children attended E. Rivers school, as did her three boys, Edgar, John and Bill. Besides church and school, the main outlet for children was playing sports like baseball and tennis in the neighborhood. "There was no T.V.," said Mrs. Dunlap pointedly. As her son Bill got older, he had a job delivering for the drugstore on the corner of Palisades and



Peachtree, the site currently occupied by Palisades restaurant.

When her marriage broke up, money was tight. Mrs. Dunlap went to work, joining the staff at Rich's in the Ladies Ready-to-Wear department. She was fortunate to arrange her hours around the time her boys were in school, working from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. It was an adjustment for the young woman who had made her debut at the Driving Club, danced at tea dances at the Biltmore Hotel with her beaux from Georgia Tech, and enjoyed a two-month long honeymoon trip to Europe. "I had to give up Garden Club, Junior League, everything but church," she said.

The church, North Avenue Presbyterian, served as her mainstay for all those years and still provides her with most of her social contact. When her job at Rich's forced her to resign from the church circle that met during the day, she agreed to join the Business Circle for working women that met at night. She still goes to their meetings every month.

Today Mrs. Dunlap is known as the lady who keeps her charming white home on Palisades Road in meticulous condition. At 89, she is often seen raking leaves and sweeping her front steps. Though her sons Bill and John cut the grass and check on her frequently, she remains fiercely independent. "I'm the yard man," she announces proudly, tending both the front yard and a large perennial border in the back that has been there since she moved into her home in 1933.

She is also a meticulous housekeeper, dusting weekly the porcelains and bric-a-brac that she has collected in her frequent travels to England and the Holy Land. It helps that she doesn't need glasses, even for driving. With her sharp eyesight, one of her favorite hobbies is sewing, making exquisite lace placemats and upholstered travel bags. Still, she admits that she is beginning to have a little trouble reading the Bible and the telephone directory.

Mrs. Dunlap's other hobby is cooking, and she is famous among friends for her special recipe pickles. As her first Christmas at Rich's loomed with little money available for Christmas presents, she hit on the idea of selling the pickles over which her friends had always clamored. For years she made 500 jars of pickles from mid-September to mid-December, stopping only when her son John, newly graduated from law school and alarmed at his mother's lack of a food license, made her swear she would never sell another jar.

Years ago, tragedy struck when her son Edgar, a pigeon racing enthusiast, was killed in a car crash on his way to a racing meet. She remembers vividly the day she heard the news, made even more poignant when all the pigeons flew home. The porcelain pigeons she collects serve as a reminder of him. They are also a perfect symbol of her indomitable spirit.

Swim and Dive Teams End Season With a Splash

On July 15, the Brookwood Hills Swim Team celebrated its terrific showing at the Fulton County Championships. The team placed third, moving up from last year's fourth place. Also important, said Swim Team Representative Susan Nowack, was the number of firsts the team received in individual races, more than any other team at the meet. According to Head Coach Jessica Stokes, the BWH team was only 31 points behind its arch rival Horseshoe Bend, who had "tons of kids" swimming and thus a greater opportunity to win points.

The team record for dual meets was three wins, two losses. Brookwood nearly won its last meet on July 11 against Horseshoe Bend, losing precious points in the relay races at the end. Says Jessica, "It was a really exciting way to end the

year."

The Brookwood Hills Dive Team concluded the year in fifth place at the County Championships. The record for the dual meets was 0 and 5, which Diving Coach Sarah Ferguson says didn't reflect how close the team came to winning some of the meets. "We lost some heartbreakers by just a few points," said Sarah, "one by four points and another by 5 points." Three BWH divers made a strong showing at the County meet. Andy Solley placed first in 11 & 12 Girls: Will Nowack placed second in 7 & 8 Boys; and Karen Bernhardt place third in Girls, 15 & Up.

Special credit for a hard-working season goes to Coach Sarah and to Diving Mom Kathy Bernhardt.

Olympic Update
