PLEASE DO NOT BRING GLASS TO THE POOL

There should be **no glass in the pool area**. It is a longstanding rule and a matter of safety. If you want to bring wine to the pool then it needs to be decanted into a plastic container **before** you get to the pool.

Even if you do not break the bottle (because you are extra careful), the glass in the trash becomes a hazard for the staff member emptying the trash. Remember safety is everyone's responsibility.

If you want to drink beer, please bring it in a can, not a bottle. If you "accidentally" find yourself at the pool with glass, please take it back home with you. Do not leave any glass at the pool.

Please also remember to recycle plastic bottles and cans.

CHECK OUT YOUR ASSESSMENT ONLINE


By going to the Website of the Fulton County Assessor's Office, http://www.fultonassessor.org, you

can find your 2008 property assessment ,even though the notices have not yet been mailed out.

At the top of the page click on Property Records. Type in your street number, street name, and from the pull-down menu select RD, DR, WAY or AVE as appropriate.

Don't put in "Northeast," as that seems to confuse the system, and don't add any more information under the Filter or Options sections. Click on Search and your record should pop up.

Your latest assessment will be listed under the Values link on the left.



In an informal survey of 10 neighbors, all found that their assessments in 2008 were a fraction lower than last year.

BWH Minutes from June 2, 2008 Board Meeting

Meeting Place: Home of Alison and Wright Caughman at 200 Camden Road

May 5th minutes to be mailed out for board approval.

Variance/NPU Zoning

Bart Cooper, 85 Wakefield Drive, presented signature update.

All neighbors signed except for Stan Dixon, Dina Woodruff, Robin and Steve Martin and Shirleys (78 Wakefield).

Neighbors next door who were previously against the renovation are now good to go.

Joe Gardner motioned to not oppose the Cooper's variance. Hayes Wilson seconded the motion and no one was opposed.

Batting, 55 Montclair presented renovation and addition to reface the back portion of his house, which exists on a corner lot – this renovation and addition requires a side and rear setback for a garage and family room.

There are issues with the width of the garage, hence the need for the side setback.

There are issues with the depth of the family room, hence the need for a rear setback.

Jamie and Leslie Carroll, next door neighbors, have approved.

Chris Boykin, another neighbor, is fine with it.

Batting did not have signatures at the meeting. NPU should sign approval on July 1 and the next step would be the zoning and review board.

There was no vote, but the board appeared fine with this course of action.

Stakes to be placed on SE and SW corners where the renovation and addition will extend.

Armour Circle – sewingmachine.com in Beltline overlay district needs a five setback variance.

Joe Jackson does not think it impacts the variance and is justified - other options for this area would be night clubs.

Joe Jackson motioned to approve, John Mulcahy second the motion and no one was opposed.

Brookwood Alliance - meeting with Lee Marro about the Buckhead community.

Property owners are taxing themselves.

Seeking overlay districts so neighborhoods can have a voice at the table.

\$150,000 necessary for planning and regulations. Funds can be raised through grants and other.

Very important to have our voice heard because of the density issue. The traffic will greatly impact our neighborhood.

Buckhead CID met with Scotty Green May 29th and there is a 50/50 chance of getting property owners to approve.

Snack Bar

A piece of the ceiling near the snack bar fell at the pool and nearly missed two small children.

Joe Noah checked it out and said there is nothing structurally wrong. He checked other components to see if there is further risk. Joe Jackson to follow up with Joe Noah.

Harvey recommended a third-party inspector and Joe Jackson will call Silverman about next steps.

BWH Entrances

Taking more time than anticipated.

Initial bids were \$300,000.

Garden Club offered to pitch in \$40,000 and upped pledge to \$75,000, with BWH pitching in \$25,000.

Garden Club will present at July meeting on July 7th.

Most likely Leslie Carroll and Esther Stokes.

Park/Pool Reservations

June 21 party with over 60 guests from 3 – 7 pm required a vote.

Cost of \$400 for pool and pavilion use.

Harvey motioned approval, Hayes second and no one opposed.

Pool Brown Out Recommendation

All children under four years-old will be required to wear bathing suits with built in swim diapers. BWH will make these available for children who do not have them.

All children under four will be required to wear a bracelet – this will be provided at check in.

There will be a 10 minute break every hour. This will be an adult swim time and children will not be permitted in the pool.

Fine of \$500 for a brown out offense and a \$25 fine if a child under the four years-old is caught without a swim diaper. This fine will be split with the guards as an incentive.

Hayes will distribute an email to all members and will post signs with these new rules at the pool.

Snack Bar Management

Management needs to tighten up. There is currently little accountability – cash register is not balancing at the end of the day, the snack bar is not being cleaned at the end of the day and daily deposits are not being made.

Hayes shared this with Tracy, but will meet with her w/o June 28th to discuss further.

Friday night cookouts are going well, but still running out of food.

Need at least one co-chair, if not two, to assist Hayes.

Cones to be placed on Huntington Road and security to be on duty for initial two hours of all swim


BWH Celebrates July Fourth



FREE YELLOW JACKET REMOVAL: At least one neighbor has suffered multiple yellow jacket stings

this season when she accidentally disturbed a nest in her garden. If you find a nest in your yard you can have it removed – for free – by Georgia Tech researchers! Biology Professor Mi-



chael Goodisman has been studying these nasty pests for some time and is always looking for more research subjects. He or some of his students will come to your property to dig up the nest and take it back to Georgia Tech. They send an anesthetic gas into the nest first (to put the yellow jackets to sleep, not to kill them) and then use a shovel to remove the nest and refill the hole with dirt. They are also willing to remove nests of hornets, paper wasps and bees. As Dr. Goodisman, says, they'll "try to deal with anything that attacks as a group."
