Annual Tree Planting Program Underway

The annual tree planting program organized by the Tree Committee of the Brookwood Hills Community Club is currently accepting requests for new trees. This program is designed to replace our aging trees that currently provide the magnificent shade canopy that we enjoy in our beautiful neighborhood. The neighborhood is funding the replacement of trees at the street or at the edge of your yard to shade the streets and sidewalks. However, trees are available for planting in a neighbor's back yard or closer to the house, as long as the landscaper can get to the location with a bobcat to deliver the tree to its planting location. Trees planted in a location that is not a "neighborhood tree" location are paid for by the homeowner.



Several weeks ago, the tree committee sent letters to those home owners who had been identified as having the most urgent need for new trees to encourage those owners to participate in this year's tree planting program. If you received one of these letters, a member of the committee will be calling you shortly to follow up on the letter. Brochures with descriptions and pictures of the trees are available to assist you with your selection. Please know that by agreeing to plant a tree in your yard or city green space, you are accepting the responsibility for watering the tree and maintaining the proper moisture levels by mulching when necessary.

The tree species which are available for the 2001 Planting include large shade trees: Nuttall Oak, Willow Oak, Allee Elm, Zelcova Village Green, and Chinese Pistache. Medium trees include October Maple Glory, and the Autumn Gold Gingko (limited number available). Neither the large or medium sized trees can be planted directly under wires. Smaller trees, such as the Redbud, Trident Maple and Crepe Myrtle, are available this year only to those homeowners who have wires over their green space, and have therefore agreed to plant a large tree in their yard. Dogwoods have been removed from the offering because they do not fare well in drought conditions.

At our first home meet, June 21, Brookwood fell to a strong Windward team 421 to 369. 
Independence Day in BWH



It was enjoyable and the authentic Chinese cuisine was very good. The staff was friendly and attentive; the specials were delicious, and the atmosphere was pleasant. We started off with a chilled Oriental chicken salad, an order of Spring rolls, and salt and pepper calamari. Entrees ordered included red snapper rolled in honey ham with a creamed corn sauce, Peking duck, house fried rice, and white rice. We finished with one mango ice cream and four spoons.

All of this for a bill of \$73 for four people. We strongly suggest that you give it a try. You can dine in, take out, or they will deliver.
