



#### A Message from the President:

The neighborhood has faced many challenges this spring and summer. The most distressing was the damage suffered by several of our neighbors when large trees fell on their homes. I'm sure everyone in the neighborhood joins me in offering sympathy and a willingness to help as those familes rebuild. We can only be grateful that no one was hurt. I am always saddened when we loose one of our magnificent old oaks, but stress and age have severely weakened many of our trees. I encourage those of you who have not already done so to call the City Arborist's office, and ask them to review your street tree. I also urge everyone to plant new shade trees in their front yards -- either through the neighborhood's tree replanting program or on your own - so that Brookwood Hills will always retain its unique character and beauty.

The mudslides and subsequent pool closings have been tiresome for everyone, but for none more so than our pool co-chairs, Benning Grice and Mark Potts, who have put in countless hours cleaning up the messes and installing temporary barricades. Please take the time to thank them for all their work and dedication. The Board is now looking into more permanent solutions to the drainage problems. We have also asked Swim Atlanta to arrange lifeguard coverage into September, so that we can extend the pool's season, and we hope to announce the extended hours shortly.

On a happier note, Brookwood Hills has once again defeated an attempt by Allied Readymix to locate a concrete batch plant next to our Clear Creek property. This time, the company had asked the Zoning Review Board to rule that concrete batch plants are a light industrial activity, which would have given Allied a way to end-run the City Council's decision not to rezone the property to I-2.

Working on the Allied Readymix issue highlighted for me just what a valuable resource we have in our Clear Creek property. It is one of the only remaining large tracks of undeveloped land in all of Fulton County. It has two wetlands, and Clear Creek has been designated as a priority waterway under the City's Greenway Acquisition project. The Board has now created a committee to investigate how best to preserve and protect our land for the future.

#### **Torrential Rains Flood Pool and Park**

This summer has been an unusual one for the Brookwood Hills Community Pool. Unfortunately, the pool has been flooded and temporarily closed due to two unusual events.

On June 30, 2003, a severe thunderstorm dumped more than 3 inches of rain onto the neighborhood in about 30 minutes. The street drains surrounding the pool became overloaded, clogged in places with tree limbs and fallen debris. The park became a pond, which ultimately overflowed into the pool. Up to 1 foot of sediment from the park ended up in the pool. We immediately retained an outside pool consultant to work with us to address the many problems, including a massive algal bloom. Vacuum lines clogged, water quality dropped off the scale, etc.

In the early morning (3-4AM) of July 14, the water main for the pool and park complex broke. Emergency staff were on site at 6 AM when the problem was first noted; however, sediment from the landscaped park once again entered the pool, which was then closed for 5 days.

There was no way that either of these events could have been predicted, and we are sorry that the pool

season has been shortened. All BWHCC members have been impacted, including our families. As luck would have it, Isabelle's birthday pool party had to be rescheduled, and Elizabeth's pool party was a success but without any swimming.

We want you to know that during all of these trying times, the pool staff have worked long hours, and we have spared no expense to expedite the return of the pool to swimmable condition. We have also taken a large number of water samples to verify the water quality and to make sure that the water is always safe.

Interim measures have been implemented to protect the pool. Protective silt fencing has been placed along most of

Wakefield and around much of the park – where previous flooding had occurred. Additionally, the main flood route during the first flood, the double-gate area on the southwest part of the pool property, has been secured with a hay bale/silt fence barrier. However, the second flood event came from the fresh, clean water line behind the bathroom/utility room near the upper park (single-gate) entrance.

We are continuing to review and evaluate long-term options for securing the pool area. Other issues we are reviewing include patrolling the street drains and debris on the sidewalks that can wash into the pool. We are also working with Swim Atlanta to see how late we can extend the pool season to make up for lost time. If you have any questions, please ask for us at the pool as we are glad to answer any of your questions. We recommend that you talk directly to us as the lifeguards are typically not aware of all the developments and ongoing activities.

Thanks again for your patience.

## **Brookwood Hills Village Cares for a Child**

Those of you who frequent the park and the pool probably saw Camden Road's liveliest housequest: Emmanuel, a fouryear-old Haitian boy who was here in Atlanta under the auspices of Children's Cross Connection USA. CCCUSA brings children from around the world to the United States for the advanced medical treatments they need but which are not available to them in their own countries. Atlanta families host the children in their homes; physicians and other health professionals donate their skills and time; and hospitals donate their facilities and supplies. In 2002, CCCUSA coordinated medical treatments for 58 children from 12 different countries. Their goal is to be able to treat 100 children in 2003.

Emmanuel was spotted over a year ago on the tiny Haitian island of La Gonave by a volunteer group of medical caregivers that included BWH neighbors Jim and Pat Ingvoldstad. "The poverty on La Gonave is beyond anything you can imagine," reports Pat. Years earlier, Emmanuel's eye was poked while playing with a stick. The eye was completely opaque and bulged painfully from the socket when he was discovered. Clearly, Emmanuel faced the prospect of a lifetime of painful disfigurement. CCCUSA accepted him as a candidate for its program, and after months of battling red tape and coordinating travel documents, doctors, hospitals, an ocular prosthetist, and host families, he was flown to Atlanta.

The day after his arrival the damaged eye was removed by Emory physician Ted Wojno. Emmanuel was relieved, sailed through his recovery without any pain medication at all, and after several weeks of healing, he received a matching prosthetic eye from oculist William "Tal" Cox. Emmanuel also received extensive dental care from pediatric dentist Allen Rosenthal. Each of these professionals generously donated their time and expertise for his medical needs. Afterward, Emmanuel told me how handsome he is now!

Three families, all with Brookwood Hills Community Club connections, hosted Emmanuel during his nine week stay in Atlanta. The hosts were former Community Club members Terri and Craig Pendergrast, Camden Road residents Alison and Wright Caughman, and Community Club members Becky and Charles McKnight. Two other Brookwood Hills neighbors are also involved with CCCUSA: orthopedist Carl Fackler is a member of their Medical Advisors Board and has performed many surgeries for CCCUSA children; and internist Brown Dennis is also an active supporter of CCCUSA and the former Chairman of the Board.

Many Community Club members who saw Emmanuel asked about how they could become involved in CCCUSA. There is always a great need for loving families who are willing to host one of these precious children. The easiest way to support this wonderful life-changing ministry is by sending in a donation. ## Copperhead Alert!

Several neighbors have reported recent encounters with Copperheads on their properties. Watch for dark, chestnut-colored bands that cross the body, breaking the color pattern into alternating bands of darker and lighter color. Young Copperheads are lighter in color than the adults, and they have a yellow-tipped tail that they often flick. The Copperhead Snake has the "honor" of having bitten more people than any other venomous snake in the United States. However, there have been very few deaths attributed to its very painful bite. Still, this snake should be considered dangerous. When encountered, it will normally remain still or move away. If it feels very threatened, it will shake its tail and strike out in self-defense. **Keep in mind, however, that even a non-fatal bite needs medical attention, is extremely painful, and may cause extensive scarring and loss of use. Don't take chances-- avoid these snakes.** (Information drawn from the NC State Cooperative Extension Service website.)


