Tremendous progress has been made on the construction in the Brookwood Hills park. As you can see from these pictures things are mov-


ing right along.

nate location. cannot make any commitments that construction will be complete or the various areas will be ready. Some final




tasks to be done (such as laying the sod in the park and refinishing the pool deck) will require the right weather and must be left undisturbed.

## The BWH Garden Club—A Commitment to the Neighborhood

At the first meeting of the Brookwood Hills Garden Club on April 29, 1938, the members agreed that the club's primary purpose was to be the improvement and beatification of Brookwood Hills. The club has followed that directive throughout is long history, financing its many projects with ambitious fund raisers. The first, an October 1938 Carnival which concluded with a dance in the empty pool, was staged to raise money for the proposed purchase of land adjacent to the neighborhood pool. When the developer donated the 5.8 acres to the neighborhood, the funds were redirected toward beautification.

The park has continued to be the major recipient of Garden Club labor and money. Subsequent fundraisers such as bake sales, harvest festivals, home tours and progressive cocktail parties have funded our annual planting of flowers and new shrubs at the pool, and numerous plantings and park improvements. In the 1970's, the club instigated a major park renovation to won local, state and

national awards. Members planted ivy on eroded banks, refurbished play equipment, put liriope and around the borders, added azaleas and dogwood trees. filled in an leveled low areas, planted an watered grass on the playing field, and established a nature trail and bird sanctuary. An expert was hired to identify the native flora on the park's botanically unique bank of largely undisturbed forest. Using San D'Angelo's donated plans, the club re-landscaped the entrances to the pool and park and provided the tables, benches and arbors in the open picnic area. In 1986, the club donated \$1,500 and labor for the entrance plantings in the park's most recent design.

In 1982, the Garden Club spearheaded a two-year study of the neighborhood's aging water oaks and provided \$1,000 in seed money for their preservation and replacement. The club has sponsored Girl Scout and Eagle Scout projects, which have improved the park and buffer zones.

As a 50th anniversary gift to the

neighborhood, the Garden Club re-landscaped the Brighton and Palisades entrance islands, an effort that followed the club's initial island landscaping over 40 years earlier, based on a plan by the late H.Boyer Marx, the husband of the club's only two term president. The \$11,000 for the project came from two Garden Club extravaganzas—a gal 50th Anniversary Cocktail Party held in the park and a highly successful Brunch/Auction.

In 1992, the Garden Club raised \$6,300 through a silent and live auction to fund reforestation of our lovely tree shaded streets. Forty young willow oaks were planted to replace trees removed due to disease and old age. In 1995, an \$18,000 joint venture with BWHCC rebuilt the sidewalks around the park, replacing trees, brick walkways, and adding mondo grass plots. The 1996 Auction raised a spectacular \$30,000 much of which was designated for Reforestation after the devastating ad infamous Hurricane Opal



pitched 40 street trees into neighborhood homes.

Though always adhering to its primary purpose, the Garden Club has not confined its efforts to Brookwood Hills. During World War II, the club maintained a model Victory Garden at Egleston Hospital, baked cookies for soldiers departing Brookwood Station, raised money for War Bonds and rolled bandages. Later projects included taking floral arrangements to hospital patients, supporting the Hillside Cottages landscaping and herb garden at Shepherd Spinal Center, and making Christmas wreaths greenery decorations for the Atlanta Symphony Christmas House, Wren's Nest and Rhodes Hall. The club annually provided a book award to an outstanding UGA landscape design student to the Environmental Workshop at Calloway Gardens. In addition, the club has always had talented members who have successfully entered major flower shows.

At the club's 50th Anniversary Tea in 1988, present and former members reminisced over the club's active past of community beautification and civic awareness and looked forward to an equally rewarding future. While giving much, the club's members have gained much. Besides the satisfaction of helping make Brookwood Hills the lovely place it is, members have learned a great deal from many of the programs presented be experts (some of whom are our own members) and have had fun socializing each most over some of the best home-cooking in the Southeast!



The club celebrated its 60th anniversary with a neighborhood party in the park in 1998, replete with barbecue, door prizes, square dancing and great camaraderie.

Also in 1998, the Garden Club continued its partnership with the Brookwood Hills Community Club and its Tree Committee providing \$13,000 to assist with funding replacement treed for old or diseased street trees throughout the neighborhood. This involvement continued to

demonstrate the Garden Club's deep commitment to marinating the natural charm and beauty of Brookwood Hills.

The 2000 Garden Club Auction raised \$34,000. This entire amount of money went towards the beautification of the neighborhood. The Garden Club designated a portion of the funds to continue funding

replacement of trees for the neighborhood. The remaining funds were directed toward the major improvements planned for the neighborhood park and pool

The 2002 Garden Club Auction will be held on Saturday, April 20th, all funds raised at the event will go directly to the neighborhood. Many wonderful items have been donated for auction including homes in

Maine and Telluride, CO. A group of artists have donated their works, and there is even an original plat of Brookwood Hills. Suites at sporting events are on the auction block and even a hockey stick signed by the entire Atlanta Thrashers team.

This promises to be a very exciting event, a great opportunity to meet your neighbors and a chance to raise funds for a great cause.


## Sponsor A Park Bench




## **BWHCC** Renewal **Payment Deadline:** March 25 2002
