Tree Trimming

The Asplundh Tree Expert Company will be moving a crew into Brookwood Hills during the week of May 20th. Asplundh works with Georgia Power and trims primarily new growth every two years in our neighborhood. The Asplundh foreman is very familiar with Brookwood Hills, which will help to expedite the trimming process.

Please be aware that Asplundh representatives will be obligated to consult with you only if trimming is necessary on a non-city tree. However, as educated homeowners we must make sure that Asplundh properly prunes our neighborhood city trees (those between the sidewalk and the street). The 1993 Brookwood Trees Watch, produced by the BWH Trees Committee and Arborguard, sets forth appropriate pruning procedures. If you do not have a copy of this report, please call Rob Donovan at the number listed below. Trammell Crow Development


Trammell Crow Residential (TRC) filed on May 14 an application with the city for a zoning variance to develop 369 apartment units on the Jewish Community Center property. Since the May 9 meeting in Rich Auditorium, TRC has reduced the number of proposed apartments from 385 to 369.

TRC's purchase contract with the Jewish Community Center is contingent on TRC obtaining this zoning variance. The front of the property is currently zoned commercial; the rear is zoned for single family residences.

The first step in the application process is to appear before the Neighborhood Planning Unit. TRC will likely be on the agenda for the June 5, 1996 NPU-E meeting. This meeting must proceed TRC's appearance before the Zoning Review Board in July and the hearing this fall concerning a change in the Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP).

As the BWH representative to NPU-E. I encourage you to attend the upcoming NPU meeting. Many of you joined us for the May 9th meeting at Rich Auditorium and we need your continued support. The NPU needs to hear many of the concerns and objections you voiced at that meeting.

The NPU meeting starts at 7:00 p.m. at the mid-town library auditorium (in the Invesco Building at the corner of Peachtree and 16th Street). If you can attend please call me at 874-9534. As the meeting agenda becomes set, I can confirm whether TRC is on the agenda.



A Playwright in BWH

Before leaving on vacation or running away from (or into) the Olympic pandemonium, make plans to see Monument Street written by our BWH neighbor Bob Simmermon. Bob and Judy have lived on Montclair in Brookwood for three years and the play is Bob's first foray into writing for the stage.

Talking to Bob, I was amazed at how simple he makes writing and producing a play sound. Like so many aspiring writers, he started with an idea and a blank page. Unlike other writers, Bob's play has ended up being a full theatrical production thanks in part to funding he received from a New York foundation. Described as a dramatic comedy about "a man who has lost his connection to his emotional and spiritual essence," the play promises to be thought provoking as well as entertaining.

Writing is not Bob Simmermon's "real" job. He has been a full-time practicing psychotherapist in Atlanta for 18 years and sits on the boards of the Psychotherapy Association Foundation and the American Psychotherapy Association. As a member of the film committee of the American Psychotherapy Association, he has worked to form a bridge between the two fields he loves: psychotherapy and media.

So, how do you go from psychotherapist to playwright? The connection seems obvious to Bob and his wife Judy. The two met while in school at Indiana University where Bob was interested in film and theater as well as psychology. Upon graduation, many of his friends went off to careers in screen writing, directing and theater, while Bob and Judy decided to "be practical" and go to graduate school, both earning their doctorates in psychology. After living overseas and teaching in Greece and other parts of Europe, they settled in Atlanta and set up separate practices.

Over the years, Bob stayed in touch with many of his college friends who are in the industry and was always reading scripts or screen plays. He has consulted on episodes of M*A*S*H, Hill Street Blues, and Newhart. "After reading other people's work for years, you get to a point in your life when you realize that you have something to say," states Bob, who started writing about six years ago. His first work was a screen play which has already been optioned to a Hollywood production company. He has also written a story for a collection of works called *Out of the Blue* by the editors of the best selling book *Chicken Soup for the Soul*.

As for Monument Street, the title is taken from the name of a street he knew as a child. Stones quarried at the river were carried down this street to be used as monuments in the cemetery. While Bob drew much of his material for the play from his own life, his work as a therapist and from his studies of the Swiss psychologist Carl Jung, his inspiration came in the form of a painting entitled "Back to the Beginning" that he saw at a local gallery. The painting now hangs over the Simmermons' living room fireplace.

The play, which is rich in symbolism, centers on the transformation of a man's life. It is the tale of a successful, forty-something man named Arthur who despite his accomplishments has lost touch with life's meaning. The two-act play explores Arthur's journey, aided by his sometimes scoundrel of a therapist named Hoffman, to rediscover his true self. The playbill synopsis declares that as part of this journey, Arthur "discovers that achievement is not self worth and propriety is no substitute for dignity."

Bob describes his concept of <u>Monument Street</u> as a sacred circle or mandala (to use the sanscrit word that Jung helped import into western thought) because the street literally begins at the river, ends at the cemetery and turns back to the begining. In the play, Arthur's grandfather offers him this piece of wisdom: "Swim naked in the river every chance you get". I asked Bob if that quote came from his own grandfather. He shook his head "No." Was it his own advise to the audience perhaps? He smiled and nodded "Yes." Monument Street runs from **June 6-9** at **the 14th Street Playhouse/Main Stage** and is being presented as part of the 50th anniversary celebration of the Georgia Psychological Foundation. All proceeds will benefit the inner city outreach program of the Academy Theater.
