Brookwood Alliance Formed

In 2006 it became apparent to then-Brookwood Hills Community Club President Benning Grice that there was a void along Peachtree Road. To the south the Midtown Alliance had organized a highly successful effort to create a "blueprint" for the area that is now being realized. To the North the Buckhead Alliance was well on its way to transforming the look and feel of the Buckhead Business District. Benning realized that the stretch of Peachtree from Deering Road to Peachtree Creek was being developed without a similar group to speak for the adjacent neighborhoods and their 1,300 households. Thus was born the "Brookwood Alliance," a 501(c)(3) not for profit corporation with representation from the civic associations of Ardmore Park, Brookwood, Brookwood Hills, Collier Hills, Collier Hills North, and Loring Heights. Brookwood Hills Board Member Joe Gardner is the current Alliance Chair. Joe is a highly respected Atlanta architect and a past president of the Georgia Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

The mission of the Brookwood Alliance is to preserve and enhance the unique identity and character of the Brookwood Community through coordinated activities of the member neighborhoods in collaboration with institutional and commercial neighbors as well as with the many government and regulatory bodies that have the power to make decisions impacting us all. The vision of the Brookwood Alliance is the fostering of a healthy and livable Brookwood Community as a "calmer oasis" between the more intensely developed communities to our north and south. The Alliance seeks area-specific planning restrictions guided by principles which promote a diversity of land uses:

- Strictly preserved single family residential neighborhoods
- Open green spaces
- Low- to mid-rise mixed-use structures built for multi-family housing, retail and commercial business purposes
- Major institutions such as Piedmont Hospital and the Shepherd Center.

The Brookwood segment of the Peachtree Corridor can shine as a walkable village, with pedestrian-friendly streets, buildings and services, and attractive, landscaped streetscapes enhanced by a variety of green and open public spaces.

The Pool Season is Here!

It's time to resurrect those bathing suits because the Brookwood Hills pool has re-opened for business. The Adult Swim program is 7 am to 9 am every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday through September 13th. The swim and dive teams have resumed practices. And best of all, the sewer issues have been resolved.

The official pool opening day for the general community club membership was set for be Friday, May 16th. Because most of the lifeguards are still in school, the pool will operate from 4 pm until 9 pm until May 23rd. Beginning Saturday May 24th the regular hours of operation will be 10 am to 9 pm Monday through Saturday and noon to 9 pm Sunday.

The pool is being managed this year by Sweetwater Pool Management. The pool manager is John Copeland; the concession stand manager is Bryant Johnson. The concession stand menu will include the usual fare of hot dogs, pizza, yogurt, fruit, frozen treats, popcorn and soft pretzels. Specialty items will also include homemade children's and adult sandwiches, salads, Chic-fil-A sandwiches and on high volume occasions grilled burgers and grilled chicken sandwiches.

The 6 pm to 8 pm Friday night cookouts will feature different caterers, the first of which will be Shane's BBQ providing dinner on May 23rd. We also are planning to bring back Friday Night Movies for the kids.

Brookwood Hills Neighbor Spotlight

Q: What exactly is your job title?

Tim: I am President and CEO of Piedmont Healthcare, which is the holding company for Piedmont Hospital, Piedmont Fayette Hospital, Piedmont Mountainside Hospital, Piedmont Newnan Hospital, Piedmont Heart Institute, Piedmont Physicians Group, Piedmont Clinic, and Piedmont Hospital Foundation.

Q: So the buck stops at your desk. Do you have a typical day?

Tim: There is no such thing as a typical day. Today I had a 7:30 am breakfast with a physician, met with the president of the Heart Institute, met with outside financial consultants, went to Rotary, met with a search firm reviewing two positions we are trying to fill, met with some folks from the Georgia Hospital Association and met with the CEO of one of our four Piedmont Hospitals. And tonight Mary and I have a business dinner. For the most part, this is an example of an average day in my life.

Q: What is your biggest challenge?

Tim: The biggest challenge is how to make sure our patients are cared for in a healing, compassionate environment.

Q: How do you define success?

Tim: Every day provides an opportunity to improve our services — enabling our physicians and employees to render exceptional care for our patients.

Q: When you were a little boy did you dream of hospital administration?

Tim: I wanted to be a history teacher and a football coach.

Q: So what happened?

Tim: I worked in the steel mills in Pittsburgh during the summers when I got old enough. The summer after my sophomore year of college the mill went on strike and I lost my job after two weeks. I worked in an ice cream factory for a few weeks but that got too boring. So I answered an ad in the paper and found a job at a Pittsburgh hospital in central supply. I worked on sterilizing equipment. I started to wonder how the hospital worked. I just got curious and talked with some of the administrators.

Q: And the rest is history?

Tim: I guess so. I got my undergraduate degree in economics and sociology and then earned my Masters in Hospital Administration from Medical College of Virginia.

Q: Did you ever have a chance to coach football?

Tim: No, but I did coach NYO baseball.

Q: How has hospital administration changed over the years?

Tim: The complexity of everything has increased dramatically from computerization to financial structures to medical techniques. I used a mimeograph machine to make copies when I started in the business and now Piedmont Hospital is one of the top 100 wired hospitals in America. Piedmont Healthcare is a billion dollar enterprise.

Q: Does Atlanta need Grady Hospital?

Tim: Absolutely! Grady is a great teaching hospital and a first class trauma center. Grady provides an important population with needed healthcare. If Grady is closed, there simply will not be enough hospital capacity to handle the needs of the city. Piedmont is full most of the time.

Q: How long have you been at Piedmont?

Tim: Seven years this December.

Q: And how did you pick Brookwood Hills?

Tim: Mary, my wife, has loved Brookwood Hills since the moment we visited Atlanta. I made a big mistake and bought a house over five miles away. I was just afraid that Brookwood Hills was too close to work. Mary was right and I was wrong. We found a house under construction in Brookwood Hills and made the move to the corner of Montclair and Wakefield.

Q: Tell me about your family.

Tim: Mary volunteers at a day shelter. We have three sons. Tim is 28 and is a writer for *Entertainment Weekly* in New York. Ryan, 25, lives in LA and is a TV production assistant. Matt, 13, is a student at Woodward Academy.

Q: And Jackson?

Tim: Oh yes, Jackson may be one of the biggest dogs in the neighborhood. I promise, he is on a diet.

Q: What do you do in your free time?

Tim: I love to play golf and read. I usually read a couple of books a week. I love Jack Whyte's books — historical fiction.

Interviewer's note: In the Brookwood Hills version of Six Degrees of Separation, Dr. Wright Caughman, Director of The Emory Clinic, also worked in a steel mill in his youth. In addition, both Mary Stack and I attended Camp Robin Hood in Chambersberg, Pennsylvania. We did not know each other at the time, perhaps because she was on the White Team and I was on the Green Team.


