
Garden Club Party Success: Nearly \$50,000 Raised for Neighborhood



Northside Drive to Receive Major Upgrades

The Buckhead Council of Neighbors, of which Brookwood Hills is a member, alerted our representatives to extensive construction on Northside beginning this summer. Northside traffic will be significantly impacted during the construction, but once completed, it will be a significant improvement over the road today.

The proposed project consists of roadway and waterline improvements along Northside Drive/SR3/US41 from I-75 to just north of the Northside Drive/Northside Parkway intersection. The project has a total project length of 2.46 miles.

The roadway portion of the project from I-75 to Collier Road includes converting the existing reversible lane to a two-way left turn lane with an exclusive left turn lane onto Collier Road. In addition, a right turn lane will be installed for the northbound Northside Drive movement turning onto Collier Road eastbound.

From Collier Road north, the work includes converting the reversible lane to a two-way left turn lane until it connects to the existing 4-lane section.

Signal equipment and pedestrian accommodations will be upgraded at the intersections of Collier Road, Woodward Way, Peachtree Battle Avenue, West Wesley Road, and Arden Road. Also a water line main and sewer line main will be included in the contract for this project.


This project is anticipated to improve the safety and efficiency of Northside Drive by removal of the reversible lane, installation of a turn lane at Collier Road, providing pedestrian accommodations throughout the corridor and installation of the City of Atlanta waterline to avoid multiple projects in the area.

Timeline:

Construction is scheduled to begin July 2012 and is expected to run for 18- 24 months (through spring/summer 2014). Lane closures will be in effect weekdays and weekends, 9:00 am - 6:00 pm. The Georgia Department of Transportation encourages residents to avoid this section of Northside Drive during construction hours.

Neighborhood Security Update

Snake Safety

Last summer, snakes became news as Atlanta and the Buckhead area, specifically, saw a spike in snake bite cases. And now with recent Copperhead sightings in Collier Hills and Brookwood Hills, it is important to be aware of how to prevent and treat snake bites.

Preventing snake bites:

- Do not try to handle any snake.
- Stay away from tall grass and piles of leaves when possible.



- · Avoid climbing on rocks or piles of wood where a snake may be hiding.
- Be aware that snakes tend to be active at night and in warm weather.
- Wear boots and long pants when working outdoors.
- Wear leather gloves when handling brush and debris.

If you are bitten, follow these first aid tips – they can save your life:

- Seek medical attention as soon as possible (dial 911 or call local Emergency Medical Services).
- Try to remember the color and shape of the snake, which can help with treatment of the snake bite.
- Keep still and calm. This can slow down the spread of venom.
- Apply first aid if you cannot get to the hospital right away.
- Lay or sit down with the bite below the level of the heart.
- Wash the bite with soap and water.
- Cover the bite with a clean, dry dressing.

Car Security

During the busy summer pool season, it is important to keep in mind that with additional cars and people around we are more likely to attract attention from potential thieves. Nationwide recommends the following to prevent car break-ins:

- Lock your doors—Simply locking the doors will deter those who might just be waiting around for an easy target.
- Keep it tidy—Almost any worthless personal item that's visible from the outside -- even an empty shopping bag -- could be seen as a valuable or a carrier of valuables.
- Conceal all the evidence—stow your electronics and accessories well out of sight-or better yet, bring it with you.
- Stash before -- not after -- you park—Get in the habit of putting shopping bags in the trunk right when you return to the vehicle, rather than after you park at the next place.
- · Completely close windows and sunroofs

area and a plenty of parking."



Keeping Math Skills Sharp Over the Summer

Editor's Note: The following article "Ask the Teacher" appeared in the May 2012 issue of Atlanta Parent magazine and features the response of Brookwood Hills neighbor, Jane Nagle of Palisades Road, who is a Math Specialist at The Westminster Schools

How can my child keep his math skills sharp over the summer break?

Summer vacation provides a needed break for all. But if children don't engage in continuous learning activities over the summer, they will inevitably forget some math skills. Regular practice with computation, problem-solving and basic math facts will maintain and strengthen the mathematical gains made over the school year. To prevent summer "brain drain," parents can easily incorporate the "Three P's" into daily activities: Play, Projects and Practice.

- Play: Many games and puzzles involve some math and encourage logical and strategic thinking. Tap children to serve as scorekeeper or banker in games like Monopoly. Other board games include Othello, Battleship, Mancala and Connect Four. Two fantastic visual spatial games are Blokus and SET. Find a free, daily SET puzzle at setgame.com. Math websites: funbrain.com, aplusmath.com, mathplayground.com, trafficjam.com, coolmath4kids.com, and puzzles.com
- **Projects:** Look for ways to discover the math in recipes, gardening, shopping budgets and sports statistics. Open a lemonade stand or take on a small construction or sewing project. Let your child be the one to calculate mileage and costs for a trip, or to chart the rise in gasoline prices.
- Practice: My favorite math workbook designed for summer practice is the Summer Math Skills Sharpener, which can be ordered online at summerskills.com. Most students should use the book for their current grade level, which will provide a review of topics just completed. To incorporate technology and an approach tailored to your child's specific needs, visit IXL Math online. This is a helpful math site that incorporates the math skills learned in a particular grade. Sign up for a monthly membership at ixl.com.

You have probably heard the recent buzz about Khan Academy, an online collection of yideo tutorials that teach a variety of subjects, including math. Click on khanacademy.org and select one of the mini-lectures on thousands of different topics.

As you work math into your summer routine, keep it fun, light and interactive for the whole family. Remember, your child is on vacation!
