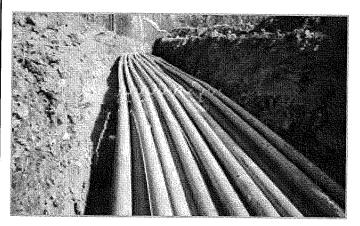
#### Burying Utility Lines in Brookwood Hills?

When I agreed this past December to take on the role as the BWHCC Beautification Chair, I reviewed the various beautification projects that neighbors have suggested to me over the years. The one potential project that has both captured my imagination and made me shudder in fear was burying the utility lines in Brookwood Hills.

The undeniable draw of the project is that it would be completely transformative to the neighborhood. Removing the utility lines would allow our wonderful architecture to shine even more than it already does. Our existing trees could flourish without the hardcore, one-sizefits-all pruning of Georgia Power's contractors. We would be free to plant different types of trees, more than the relatively small list of tree species that Georgia Power allows under utility lines. Finally, it would eliminate one of the main causes of power outages – tree limbs falling on the wires.

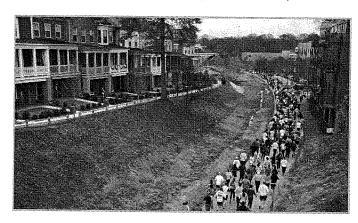
At the same time, the idea of burying utility lines gives me major heartburn. While new underground drilling technologies enable an undergrounding project to go forward without tearing up existing infrastructure (sidewalks, driveways, streets, existing trees), it is still a massive, complex and expensive project. Georgia Power provides no direct financial assistance to bury utility lines, and there is no financing vehicle for neighborhoods to self-finance the project. This adds to the complexity and cost hurdles.

As I've watched the Beltline project unfold over the past several years, I find the project similar to a potential neighborhood utility line burial project. They're both massive, complex and extremely expensive – and at the same time, potentially transformative if completed. The

approach Beltline authorities have taken to that project seems applicable to a utility line project. The Beltline project is a long-term effort where parts of the whole are completed in phases as financing becomes available.

While the Beltline authorities have undertaken various attempts to unlock big sources of financing, they've also green-lit much smaller pieces of the whole, like the two-mile Eastside Trail near Piedmont Park. These prominent projects can serve to validate the larger goal's merit.

I have formed a utility line burial committee (currently comprised of Merrell Thompson, Jim Moyihan and me). Over the coming weeks, we will reach out to neighbors to see what interest and appetite they have for a utility line burial project. Galvanizing 100% of the neighborhood to support this project is likely impossible (though we will see!). There will always be people who are selling their homes, who just had a baby, who are thinking about their retirement income, about to undertake an expensive home renovation, etc. If we can find pockets of interest – whether an entire street or just a subsection of a street (e.g. Lower Camden) – it would be a way to get us started. It goes without saying: this project won't get done unless we get started!

Our committee spent considerable time with Georgia Power over the past four months learning about this process. In the next BrookNotes, we'll share what we've learned relative to costs and logistics. There are several smaller, less expensive steps that individuals can take to bury at least some of our wires.

#### Summer Water Safety

Editor's Note: For Brookwood Hills families with young children, our lives revolve around the pool during the summer. At the start of each pool season, BrookNotes will run pool safety information as a reminder to be vigilant when our children are in the water. Let's help each other out and keep an eye on any nearby kids, too. If you have concern about any person in the water, lend a hand and alert a lifeguard.

Think drowning involves screaming, gasping, and flailing? Think it's easy to notice someone drowning? Well, you're wrong. Drowning is a silent killer. There's no splashing, waving or calling for help of any kind. It's not like what you see on TV. Many people would not even notice another person drowning at just 30 yards away. Read on for tips on how to keep yourself and those you love safe from this silent killer whether at the beach or in your backyard pool.

#### The Facts about this Silent Killer

The Instinctive Drowning Response, a term coined by Francesco A. Pia, Ph.D., is what people instinctively do to avoid suffocation when drowning. The responses to drowning are undramatic and surprisingly quiet. Drowning is the leading cause of injury death for young children ages one to four. Even scarier is that in a small but significant percentage of kids' drownings, an adult will have watched the whole process, not having a clue what was happening (Source: CDC).

#### Doesn't Look Like What You'd Expect

Dr. Pia, in an article entitled "It Doesn't Look Like They're Drowning" featured in the Coast Guard's On Scene Magazine (Fall 2006), describes the typical drowning response as follows: "Except in rare circumstances, drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The respiratory system was designed for breathing. Speech is the secondary or overlaid function. Breathing must be fulfilled before speech occurs. Drowning people's mouths alternately sink below and reappear above the surface of the water. The mouth of a drowning person is not above the surface of the water long enough to exhale, inhale, and call out for help. When the drowning person's mouth is above the surface, she exhales and inhales quickly as her mouth starts to sink below the surface of the water.

Drowning people cannot wave for help. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface. Pressing down on the surface of the water permits drowning people to leverage their bodies so they can lift their mouths out of the water to breathe. Throughout the Instinctive Drowning Response drowning people cannot voluntarily control their

arm movements. Physiologically, drowning people who are struggling on the surface of the water cannot stop drowning and perform voluntary movements such as waving for help, moving toward a rescuer or reaching out for a piece of rescue equipment. From beginning to end of the Instinctive Drowning Response people's bodies remain upright in the water with no evidence of a supporting kick. Unless rescued by a trained lifeguard, these drowning people can only struggle on the surface of the water from 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs."

#### Signs of Drowning

Watch for these signs the next time you're swimming with your kids or others:

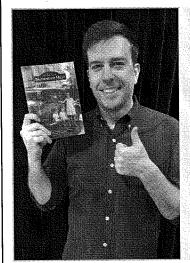
- Head low in the water, mouth at water level
- Head tilted back with open mouth
- Hair over forehead or eyes
- Eyes glassy, empty and unable to focus
- Eyes closed
- Hyperventilating or gasping
- Not using legs
- Body is vertical and upright
- Trying to swim in a certain direction but not making progress
- Trying to roll over on the back

#### Stay Aware to Save a Life

Keep your eyes open for any oddities. Even when things seem ok, they may not be. A good way to be sure is to ask your kid or the person you're swimming with if he or she is all right. If they are rather still, do not answer or have a blank stare, then you may have less than 30 seconds to get to them!

As any parent knows, kids make noise in the water. If they are not making noise, find out why, and if needed, get them out of the water ASAP.

#### Safe Driving Reminders



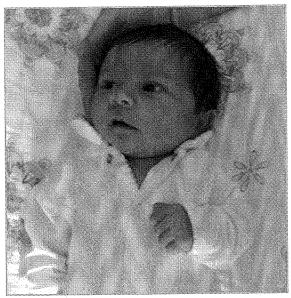

Please be advised that starting April 21st and continuing on, there is increased enforcement of the stop sign at the intersection of Brighton and Wakefield.

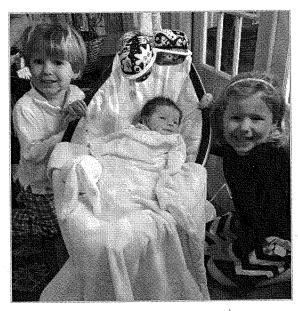
## New Arrivals in Brookwood Hills
