

AMBROSIA BEETLES AND ATLANTA'S URBAN TREES

There has been a dramatic increase in Ambrosia Beetle infestations in Atlanta since June of 1997. The arborists at Arborguard Tree Specialists initially noted increased infestations on construction or root damaged trees. Ambrosia Beetles now appear to be multiplying dramatically and attacking "weak trees".

"We have observed hundreds of trees affected with ambrosia beetles. Brookwood Hills, Peachtree Hills, Ansley, Buckhead, Brookhaven and other areas of Atlanta have observed this destructive pest. Sadly, the infestation is often fatal," said Chris Nasca, Technical Services Supervisor and ISA Certified Arborist with Arborguard Tree Specialists.

There are several theories in consideration for the cause of beetle infestations. One says that when a tree has a reduction in starches (stored reserves), the pests can sense it. If the pest is present and environmental conditions are favorable, the pest feeds and multiplies. Reasons for starch reductions are numerous: genetics, specifically age and species, mechanical/construction damage, environmental heat, wind, light and moisture, competition, insects, diseases (fungi) and microorganisms.

Starches are the "bank account" of the tree. Each time a tree responds to a stress stimulus it draws on this account. If the starch levels drop and the leaf surface and/or root system is unable to produce the energy to replace the loss, then the tree has a downward spiraling account. As in most living things, the genetic aging process can play a role. Many infested trees are (in a rather simplistically stated way) mature. The mature urban forest in Atlanta is aging in group clusters from trees planted fifty or more years ago.

Ambrosia Beetles are from the family called shot hole borers and have several subspecies. The Asian Ambrosia appears most often. Sawdust appearing on the tree trunks and/or tubes of sawdust the diameter of pencil lead, ½" or longer are their most obvious sign. The adults and larvae do not feed on the tree. The beetles carry a fungi into the tree to

grow for consumption. There may be several infestations/ generations per season. Once ambrosia beetles have infested a tree, odds are very low that systemic fungicides or insecticides will be effective in controlling the disorder.

If trees are in a stressed state, and most urban trees are, preventative measures can be taken to reduce


the infestation and spread of the beetles. The trunks should be treated with an insecticide to help ward off infestation. Only materials labeled for borers and tree species should be used. Other efforts, such as proper watering, damage avoidance, proper fertilization, Biostimulants, and mulching must be employed to increase the odds of tree vigor. Avoid high nitrogen or quick release fertilizers on newly planted, stressed, or mature trees.

As with all tree related issues, it is important to remember that healthy trees are more naturally resistant to disease and pest infestation. A good program of watering, soil therapy, and pruning will help urban trees cope with the stress of life in Atlanta.

PIPE CLEANING PROJECT COMPLETE




The inconvenience is over, but how many of us truly understood just what condition our pipes were in? A concerned neighbor obtained a cross section of pipe and took this photo. This is actual pipe from our neighborhood, and it shows the degree of "tuberculation" and other accumulations that lead to many of our water problems. Our pipes were cleaned and lined with a special cement mortar lining. Cleaning and lining is an alternative to pipe replacement.

The newly restored pipes should last 35-40 years and at a much lower cost both economically and in terms of inconvenience. It was worth the trouble of driving over lines and slowing down for work crews!
