

Tree Report:

Last month, a family in the neighborhood took down several large trees without a permit. The homeowners maintain that the trees were dead; their neighbors contend the trees were healthy. The City of Atlanta's tree ordinance prohibits the removal of any tree with a diameter at breast height (dbh) of six inches or more without a permit. The permit process serves as an important check and balance on our ability to destroy important elements of our urban forest that ought to be protected. By the same token, it allows for the removal of trees where compelling reasons exist, such as when a tree is dead. Moreover, it ensures, in such a case, that the state of the tree can be properly examined while all the evidence as to the tree's health is available, thereby sparing homeowners and their neighbors a lot of potential controversy and aggravation once a tree is removed. Please abide by this important rule and ask your tree service or landscape company for a copy of the required permit before allowing them to remove a tree. Also, please note that the City has recently increased its enforcement of the tree ordinance.

Additionally, please use care in selecting professionals to work on your trees. There appears to be a wide disparity among tree services as to quality. The neighborhood has experienced recent cases in which substandard work by certain tree removal services has resulted in damage to nearby trees, including a case in which the crew that removed one tree damaged the roots of another tree with its heavy equipment, and tossed heavy logs up against the trunk of a third tree, causing damage to it as well.

If you need to do work on a large tree, such as cabling (where a tree needs structural support) or removal of a large tree that is dead, an acquaintance in Haynes Manor highly recommends Casey Tree Experts. She says Mr. Casey does "expert" work on extremely difficult jobs, and is very "careful" and "attentive." His prices are mid-range. The telephone number for Casey Tree Experts is 770-498-7000.

32 New Trees to be Planted in January

Thirty-two homeowners responded to requests from the neighborhood tree committee to plant a new shade tree in their yard or at the street in front of their house. Our order was placed in early October to ensure the highest quality trees were available and selected for our replanting program. The trees will be replanted just after the first of the year. Of the trees selected, 29 are large to medium-sized shade varieties.

Neighbors who have received a new tree in recent years are asked to remember to keep the roots moist, and this includes watering during the fall and winter months if weather conditions are dry. Also, members of the tree committee put a mulch of pine straw around the base of many of the new trees this summer. We encourage you to help retain moisture around these trees by maintaining a layer of mulch 2-3 inches deep, particularly on all new trees.

Did you know...

that a seal of dried sap will form over a freshly cut Christmas tree stump in four to six hours if the water line drops below the base of the tree, preventing the tree from absorbing water when the stand is refilled? So, if you have your tree seller make the cut, remember to put your tree in water as soon as you get it home, and remember to keep your stand full. A tree will absorb as much as a gallon of water in the first 24 hours, and a quart or more per day thereafter.
