New Principal and New facilities: BWH Roars with Enthusiasm for E. Rivers Elementary

Thirty-one Brookwood Hills children (including 8 kindergarteners) are proud to be E. Rivers Elementary Lions for the 2012-2013 school year. The school has just completed a very successful \$110,000 annual fund campaign for the E. Rivers Educational Foundation thanks to the strong support of parents and teachers. The foundation serves to enhance learning experiences for all students by funding many different projects including field trips, extra teacher training, phonics curriculum, hands-on science and technology learning labs and an exciting new iPad pilot program starting next month.

New Principal

The school year has gotten off to a great start with new principal, Matt Rogers. Mr. Rogers grew up in the metro Atlanta area, completed undergraduate degrees in Psychology and Education followed by Masters degrees in professional counseling and school counseling. He began his career as a 5th grade teacher in Cobb County then served ten years at a middle school in Fulton County as a counselor and assistant principal. For the past three years, Mr. Rogers served as principal to Creek View Elementary School's 965 students in Alpharetta.

Principal Rogers places great importance on the relationship that is built between student and teacher and between the school and the home. The school's staff stresses that strong relationships are founded on trust and are strengthened by consistent support, encouragement and open communication. E. Rivers continues to be an International Baccalaureate (IB) certified school with 1st through 5th graders enjoying daily instruction in French.

New Facilities

Preparations are being made for E. Rivers new facilities! Next summer, staff and students will relocate to the Sutton Middle School campus by Chastain Horse Park for two years, while a new \$20 million, LEED certified building is built on the current E. Rivers campus. The new school will accommodate 800 children at peak capacity (for comparison Morris Brandon currently has over 1000 students and Jackson over 900). The community looks forward to a building that reflects on the outside the deep commitment to learning held by students and teachers on the inside since the school's founding in 1917.

Nancy has served as the Brookwood Hills bookkeeper for 27 years. In 1985, she was asked to be treasurer of the board. To ensure greater continuity, she was then asked to become the Brookwood Hills bookkeeper and she took the job, receiving \$100 per month in payment. At the time, the association's operations, dues and budget were on a much smaller scale. Nancy describes the changes in the years to follow as "astounding!"

After 30 years of federal service, Don is retiring from his role as U.S. Trustee at the end of this year. Nancy was a middle school science teacher at the Lovett School for 21 years, retiring in 2008. The couple loves to travel, having visited all 7 continents and over 50 countries in their 42 years of marriage. They will continue to do so in the coming years, and are planning a trip to Southeast Asia in January of 2013.

In prior years, Nancy was active with Friends of Egleston Hospital, now known as Friends of Children's Hospital, and with the BWH Garden Club. More recently, she has been very involved with the BWH Legacy Ladies, a group for neighborhood women over 60. Don served on the Brookwood Hills board, was President of the Community Club and founded Brookwood Hills Boys with other neighborhood fathers to coordinate father/son outings as an alternative to Cub Scouts. It continues in the neighborhood for both boys and girls.

When the couple moved to Brookwood Hills, their children, Leslie and Geoffrey, were one and three years old. Leslie and Geoffrey are now both married with three children each but they continue to be close with those they grew up with here, and Nancy and Don will remain close friends with many in the neighborhood as well. Nancy and Don are moving to Athens to be close to their family, but it is also a return to a place they love. They lived in Athens previously while Don was in law school and are moving to a house in the Five Points area of Athens close to where they lived over 40 years ago! ing on this monumental task once again.










