Update on Proposed Development at Peachtree-Collier Intersection

The proposed development along the east side of Peachtree Road at the intersection of Collier Road is a significant one for Brookwood Hills and involves NPU/zoning issues with important implications for our neighborhood. Encompassing the current footprint of (i) the existing Chick-fil-A store; (ii) the Peachtree Road Package Store (Liquor Store); (iii) the Peachtree Cleaners & Laundry; and (iv) the former Harry's in a Hurry, the proposed development will involve a 7-story medical office building and associated parking decks incorporated around a reconfigured Chick-fil-A store on the first floor. A second retail establishment on the first floor is also planned. The proposed development requires an application for rezoning, which will necessitate input from our Neighborhood Planning Unit (NPU).

This development has evolved significantly over the past 9 months. In February 2013, a committee of Brookwood Hills Community Club ("BWHCC") Board members and neighbors was formed to meet with the developer, Cornerstone Development Partners LLC ("Cornerstone"). The BWHCC Board engaged a very experienced attorney, Bob Zoeckler, to provide legal advice regarding zoning implications and other land use considerations. The BWHCC Board also engaged Aaron Fortner, a principal with an Atlanta-based planning and design consulting firm.

In evaluating the proposed development, the Brookwood Hills committee focused on three major areas: (i) zoning issues and the potential zoning precedent for other commercial areas adjoining the neighborhood; (ii) the height and appearance of the building and associated parking decks; and (iii) the potential impact on traffic patterns. Following repeated meetings with the Cornerstone developers as well as city officials, the Brookwood Hills committee developed a consensus regarding certain conditions that would need to be met in order to achieve possible NPU support from the neighborhood. Two critical conditions included: (i) no movement of the existing single family residential (R-4) zoning line which bisects the relevant property; and (ii) no variances (direct or indirect) to the transitional height plane requirements affecting the property.

In addition, if not covered under these specific conditions, the Brookwood Hills committee articulated a general view that the office building should not be taller than 100 ft. in height (excluding any parapets). The committee determined this height based on a study of the existing tall buildings along Peachtree from I-85 through 2001 Peachtree (the study excluded The Brookwood which is out of scale with the other buildings). The study concluded that the six existing buildings plus the building to be built at the Joel & Associates property (at the corner of Huntington and Peachtree) average 98 feet and 7 floors in height, excluding parapets (i.e. the screens at the tops of buildings).

Throughout this entire process, the committee kept in close touch with our City Councilmembers, Howard Shook and Alex Wan, and they have been fully supportive of the committee's approach.

In October 2013, the Cornerstone developers prepared a new of set of plans that appeared to meet the committee's primary conditions. As a result, the developers were invited to present their plans at the November 4 meeting of the BWHCC Board. On November 13, Lesley and Jamie Carroll kindly hosted another meeting with the Cornerstone developers to allow certain "high impact" neighbors (i.e. neighbors on Montclair and at the top of Brighton, Camden, Wakefield and Palisades) to

ask questions and learn more about the development. Based on ongoing feedback from neighbors, the Brookwood Hills committee is currently seeking to negotiate certain conditions related to construction, landscaping, signage, parking and traffic flow. If not permitted by the City in the actual zoning application, such conditions may be moved to a separate side agreement between Cornerstone and BWHCC.

In terms of the timetable for this process, it is expected that the BWHCC Board will vote regarding our position on Cornerstone's zoning application (and associated conditions) at the December 2 Board meeting, in advance of a December 3 meeting of our NPU. The application will then be reviewed at a December hearing of the Atlanta Zoning Review Board.

Filled with potted mums or other fall flowers, this fun centerpiece will top off your Thanksgiving table in fitting fashion. **MATERIALS**: Black felt, square yard; Terracotta pot; Permanent red marker; Black poster board; Carpet tape; Yellow poster board

- 1. Tape a square yard of black felt to your work surface and set a terra-cotta pot (ours is 7 inches tall and 7 1/2 inches across) on its side at one edge of the felt, as shown. Roll the pot, tracing along the top and bottom edges with a permanent red marker as you go, then cut out the felt arc.
- 2. Next, cut two 15-inch circles, one from black poster board, the other from the remaining black felt. Set the pot upside down in the center of the poster board circle, trace around its rim, then cut out the inner circle to create a large ring. Now trace the rim of the pot in the center of the felt circle and cut an asterisk in the center, as specified.
- 3. Tape the felt circle atop the poster board ring. Set the bottom of the pot on the asterisk and slide the brim up to the rim of the pot. Attach strips of carpet tape to the outside of the pot, then tape one end of the felt arc to the side and wrap the arc around the pot, sticking it to the tape
- 4. Trim away any excess felt. For the finishing touch, tape on a buckle cut from yellow poster board.


The costume contest showed how creative our BWH children are. Costumes ranged from princesses to monsters to candy boxes and everything in between. It's always fun to see what the children will come up with.

We have so many interesting people living in Brookwood Hills. So, occasionally we highlight a neighbor in our BrookNotes publication. Matt Thompson....

thank you for taking time to let us into your business!

So tell us... what do you do? I make adult cartoons, similar in humor style to something like South Park. I have been doing it for about 15 years now, first starting off making cartoons for Cartoon Network's Adult Swim. I currently am in production on three shows, all of them for FX. Bigfoot is about well... Bigfoot and it stars Seth Rogen. Another about a rapper is called Chozen and that comes from Danny McBride's company with him starring in it as well. Lastly, I am going into my fifth season of Archer, which is a show about a jerk-ball spy. Archer has been my most successful show and it has been a lot of fun to make. From time to time, the cast and I even put on a live version of the show, which is weird and fun. All of the cartoons shows are made here in Atlanta by my staff of about 150 really talented artists.

What happens when people find out you make cartoons for a living? Usually I get the same thing: what an amazing and fun job! Do you just sit around having fun all day? In truth, it is just like every other job: you go to the office, do your thing, and hope to make it home in time for dinner. But I guess there are cool things about it. One my favorite things is seeing my family animated. All of my kids have been in my shows, both in look and voice. Also, early on when we needed someone to model some inspirational poses for a character, I took pictures of my very understanding wife and turned them into drawings, which was... fun.

What about your BWH friends and neighbors...have any of them been in any of your shows? Yes, definitely! ...some of our BWH friends and neighbors have been in shows for me. Marshal McCormack had a big part in a pilot I did for FOX and Freddy Simon is used as the face model of a current character in my show Archer. The character is named Ramone Limone and he is a hit man from Cuba voiced by Ron Perlman. In fact, Freddy's character is back for an episode in the upcoming season. I think Freddy has had a lot of fun with it. At least I hope he has.

Did you always know you wanted to go into animated production? I never had a real interest in cartoons besides just watching them as a kid. I cannot even draw very well. I kinda backed into it. What I wanted to do was tell funny stories for either movies or TV. I tried to get hired most everywhere on the planet when I was much younger. Out of pity Cartoon Network eventually offered me a job as a Production Assistant and I have been making cartoons ever since. I have done a little bit of live action stuff here and there, but I keep returning to cartoons. The medium gives you ultimate control of the story telling. You can replace any storyline or performance at any time, quickly reshaping things when you see they are not working or you have a different / better idea. With live action, you are locked into what you shot. I also like how I get to live in Atlanta as opposed to NY or LA. If I switched over to live action, chances are that I would have to move. And now that BWH has their own band, I just don't want to do that.

What current or past shows are/have been your greatest inspiration? For cartoons it's The Simpsons. I have not watched it in a while, but there was a time when I would watch a stack reel of old episodes for two hours a day. It was not a very productive time, but it was a time. For telling your story in a clever way that makes things rap back upon itself, Seinfeld and Mr. Show. For making reality funny, The Larry Sanders Show. Mostly now though I just watch sports because I feel like I have seen everything. And with Georgia and the Falcons so beat up, I am not watching much TV at all. Instead I find myself wandering through our neighborhood, looking through all of your windows.

What advice would you give to any young person interested in following in your footsteps!? Put something out on YouTube and try and get your hits up. Don't be concerned with someone stealing your idea. You need people to notice you.

Give them the straight scoop...how often do you make it home for dinner? Sadly, not very often. I am working on it. Dan Granot just helped me move my studio into a new space in Atlantic Station. With the move behind me, I am hoping the shorter commute gets me home in time to yell at my children more.

So, you mentioned that Archer has a new season coming up? When does it premiere for those of us interested in tuning in? Season 5 of Archer airs on Monday nights in February on FX. If you don't like it, blame Freddy.

The Historic Randolph Lucas House Relocation

BWH neighbor Mac Irvin set his alarm clock for 3:15 a.m. to make sure he saw the Historic Randolph Lucas house as it was passing Brighton Road on its way to its new home in Ansley Park..

The historic Randolph-Lucas House was relocated from 2500 Peachtree Road in the Buckhead community of Atlanta to 78 Peachtree Circle in Atlanta's historic Ansley Park neighborhood Friday evening of November 8th. The house was transported south on Peachtree Road from its intersection with Lindbergh Drive around midnight on November 7th.

Since February, Christopher Jones and Roger Smith, founders of NewTown Partners, have been working with the Buckhead Heritage Society, the 2500 Peachtree Condominium Association, the City of Atlanta, and other partners to coordinate the logistics of moving the structure, which is a locally designated Historic Building in the City of Atlanta. Jones and Smith will use the house as their primary residence once it is relocated to Ansley Park.

Regarding the relocation, Buckhead Heritage Society President, Wright Mitchell, stated: "The relocation of the Randolph-Lucas House to Ansley Park is the culmination of many months of hard work by Christopher Jones and Roger Smith of NewTown Partners, the 2500 Peachtree Condominium Association, the City of Atlanta and Buckhead Heritage Society. This project sets an example, not only in the City of Atlanta, but nationally as well, regarding how creative minds and committed individuals can come together to solve even the most difficult historic preservation problems."
