The event included a special area, Carson's Corner, for our youngest attendees to create an art project for patients at CHOA. Thanks to our generous donors and enthusiastic attendees, Brookwood Hills donated dozens of new journals and \$800 to CHOA specifically in honor of Carson Cox.

Their presentation included a special appearance by Darth Vader. 

Introducing our New Security Head



Lieutenant Jeff Baxter has been with the Atlanta Police Department (APD) since 1997. After winning the Physical Fitness Award for his police academy class, he selected the Zone 2 Precinct (Buckhead) as his patrol area. While a patrolman in Zone 2, he started working the Neighborhood Security Patrol for Barry Miller and has been working in the neighborhoods ever since.

After getting promoted to Sergeant, he worked in the Zone 3 Precinct, then in the Homeland Security unit. After his promotion to Lieutenant, he was assigned to the Zone 1 precinct. In 2012, he was tapped to create a new unit within APD to provide public safety for the Atlanta Beltline.

Lt. Baxter has his Bachelor's degree from Georgia State University in Criminal Justice, and his Masters of Public Administration from Columbus State University. He's also a certified police instructor and served as a military policeman in the United States Marine Corps Reserve. Lt. Baxter has been married for 14 years and has a daughter Madison (13 years old) and a son Mason (9 years old).

Security Update

Holidays are a magical time in Brookwood Hills but, unfortunately, it also means an increase in crime. A few holiday reminders:

Checking phone messages while parked –While out and about please do not check your messages while parked in your car. Checking phone messages makes you unaware of surroundings and a target for car jacking.

Gifts – Avoid leaving gifts out in the open, whether inside your car or visible through a home window.

Boxes – Please do not leave boxes of expensive items on the curb. This advertises and attracts crime. Boxes can be turned inside out or brought out to the curb the morning of trash pick-up.

Awareness – We want to thank those neighbors that continue to report suspicious behavior. If you notice suspicious activity or feel uncomfortable at anytime, please call 911, post on Village Defense and contact security patrol. Pictures of an incident, if done safely, are encouraged.

Lighting – A well-lit house is a deterrent to crime. With LED bulbs reducing the cost of electricity, there is no excuse for having a dark home. This goes for inside the home, where timers are effective, as well as outside the home.

Travel – If traveling for the holiday, please call the security hotline to report your address and travel dates (we are working on an email notification system). Security patrol will check your home while you are away.

Solicitation – Illegal solicitation was more frequent this year, and I feel we have greatly improved in our response as a neighborhood. As a reminder, city ordinance makes it illegal to solicit in our neighborhood. If someone knocks on your door, please do not open your door. Let the solicitor know that it is illegal to solicit without a permit.



Next call 911, post on Village Defense APP and then call security patrol.

Security Communication Change

With adoption of the Village Defense (VD) app by most of our neighborhood, we will be stopping the use of the security signs at the entrances of our neighborhood. For those that don't use a smartphone, you can register to have Village Defense call you when an incident occurs. We've found this process faster and safer than recording and posting signs. Please contact security@brookwoodhills.com for questions regarding this change.

One of our long term goals is to have security patrol formally monitor Village Defense postings 24/7. Today, they are monitoring when on duty but we don't have full coverage via phone nor on the Village Defense app. Although I believe we need 24/7 coverage by patrol, we have a limited budget and neighbors continually use the app for non-security related issues. Once postings cease for lost pets and non-security issues, we will ask Patrol to price 24/7 coverage.

Security Patrol Holiday Bonus


