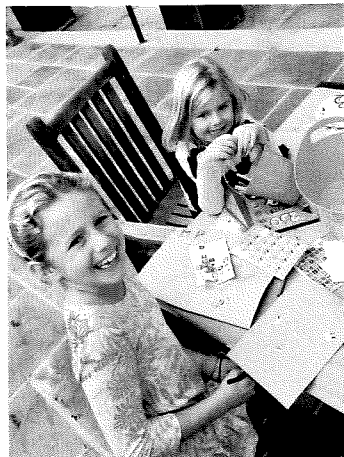
Best Butt 2018

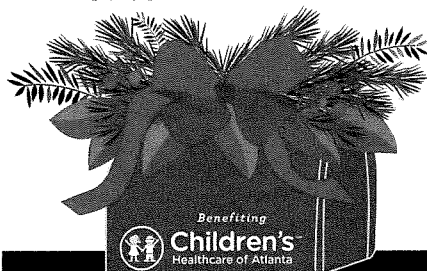

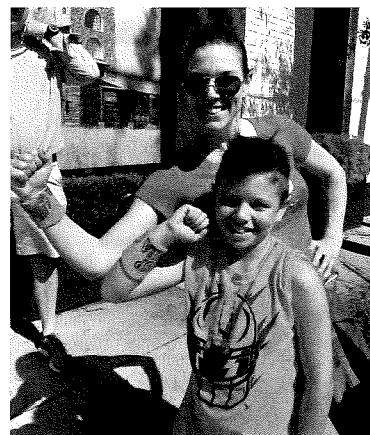

End-of-Year Security Message

With the Holidays and the New Year approaching, here is an introduction to the BWH Security Procedures for new neighbors and a refresher for our current residents. Security benefits are provided to current Brookwood Hills Community Club members.

Security Concern or Request

Recommended Action

- There was a break-in or attempted break-in at your home or vehicle.
- You see suspicious activity in the neighborhood.
- A solicitor has come to your door to try to sell something.

1. First, **call 911**.
2. Then, call the Security Patrol cell phone at (404) 242-3321.
3. Finally, report the incident to BWH Security Chair Matt Little by e-mailing security@brookwoodhills.com

You are going out of town.

E-mail the BWH Security Patrol at brookwoodhillspatrol@gmail.com to provide your address and the dates you will be away. The Security Patrol will check on your home daily while you are away.

You need a Brookwood Hills parking sticker for your car.

Matt Little distributes the BWH parking stickers. Email your request to security@brookwoodhills.com.

You have installed security cameras in or around your home.

E-mail the BWH Security Chair Matt Little at security@brookwoodhills.com to request BWH Security Camera signage that can be displayed in your yard.

Security Phone Numbers

911 - You should call 911 for everything from solicitations to invasive crimes.

Our Security Patrol

Lt. Jeff Baxter leads a group of retired and off-duty officers who patrol our neighborhood and others in the Buckhead area. You may see the officers driving in the neighborhood on Atlanta Police motorcycles or in marked non-police vehicles. Our security patrol service has served and protected our neighborhood for over 30 years. In our neighborhood, the security patrol is financed by the Brookwood Hills Community Club. A large percentage of annual membership dues cover the associated costs. Throughout the years, our neighborhood has seen a lessening of the more invasive crimes as well as petty crimes thanks to this patrol. As a Brookwood Hills resident, it is important to join the community club to contribute to our security programs. You should also be aware of your surroundings and know the procedures to report an incident.

Crime Prevention Tips

Solicitation

City ordinance makes it illegal to solicit in our neighborhood. If someone knocks on your door unexpectedly, please do not open it. Let the solicitor know that it is illegal to solicit. Next, call 911. Then, you may call our security patrol and finally, notify the BWH Security Chair Matt Little at security@brookwoodhills.com

Make sure you home looks lived in

- Notify the security patrol if you go out of town so we can keep an eye out for newspapers, packages, flyers, and other things that can pile up to make a home look unoccupied and like a target for burglars.
- Consider stopping your mail with USPS to prevent an overloaded mailbox and/or mail theft.
- Consider lights and/or radio on a timer when away from home so they switch on/off automatically. A lot of newer wi-fi outlets have the capability of switching on/off intermittently if set properly.
- Holiday lights on the outside of the home can also give the indications that someone is home. These, too, can be set on a timer.

Christmas Trees: Presents wrapped under a Christmas tree visible from a front window can help burglars decide whether the house is a worthwhile target. Consider closing the blinds / curtains if the tree is visible from the front of the house.

Trash at the street: Empty boxes from televisions, computers, etc. can indicate what's inside the house after Christmas.

Spare Keys: Consider leaving a key with a friend/neighbor or invest in a smart lock that can open with code.

Social Media

- Be mindful of what you post on social media - including travel plans. Consider making your account private to friends and family.
- A family name on the mailbox or the front of the house makes it easy to identify who lives there.
- Also, remember that all homeowner information is available to the public via free online tax records. It is easy to punch in a street address, find the owner, and then search for the social media accounts of anyone by that name. Thieves are smarter than they used to be and many young adults we encounter have grown up with social media.

Storage / Security of valuables

- Consider a safe for the home or utilize a bank's safe deposit box to store your most valuable items. Secure firearms in a safe. There are safes available that offer quick access to firearms - such as bio-metric fingerprint readers that quickly unlock and pop open.
- A monitored security alarm will sound an audible alert and the alarm company dispatches the police if the alarm is activated. The audible alert may be enough to cause a would-be burglar to flee if it sounds.
- There are several affordable wi-fi enabled camera systems that are easy to self-install and monitor from your smart phone no matter where you are. An example is the Ring doorbell. We have had some really good images of burglars and package thieves from Ring doorbells in Atlanta. The video is stored in the cloud so it can be retrieved even if the doorbell/camera is damaged or stolen. You can also be notified any time someone approaches your front door.

Protect Your Vehicle

- Loading up on gifts is a sign of progress in the holiday shopping. But, if those packages are left out in the open after they're in the car, your car has become a likely target. Remember the cliché "Out of sight, out of mind?" The same applies to items in your car.
- Always lock your vehicle and store all items out of sight. Breaking into an empty car isn't worth a thief's time. However, anything left in plain view—from your holiday gifts to spare change, sunglasses, CDs, cell phones or briefcases—may tempt a thief.
- Do not leave a gun/firearm inside your parked vehicle.
- Help prevent your vehicle from being stolen by always locking your car and using anti-theft devices. And although it's cold, never leave your vehicle running while you run inside your home or a store—even if for only a minute or two.
- Do not leave a spare key or key fob in your vehicle.

Prevent Package Thefts

- Track deliveries online and confirm delivery has occurred. You can sign up for email notifications to track your packages from initial shipment to its arrival at your home, or the recipient's address if you have the gift delivered directly.
- If you know a family member or neighbor will be home, ask them to pick up the packages as soon as they are delivered.
- Switch delivery location to work where it can be received by someone and not left on the porch.
- See if the post office or store the product is being shipped from can hold the package for pick up.
- The post office will allow your package to remain safe and secure for up to 30 days.

Park Construction Update

It has been a rainy November, which has made our park very wet and reminded us all why this drainage work is so important! It has also made construction more challenging, but progress continues. Foundation work has begun on the new bathroom building. Look for the building itself to come out of the ground in early December.

In other exciting news, playground equipment is scheduled to be delivered by the end of the year. All playground equipment will be replaced. The one structure that will remain is the existing open-air pavilion near the Parkdale entrance, though it will be significantly enhanced with a refurbished roof and a patio to physically connect the pavilion to the rest of the park. Our playground equipment supplier, based in Minnesota, is one of the best in the country. We are going to have an amazing playground for the children of Brookwood Hills for many, many years to come.

The project remains on track and we still expect to be finished by mid-April.

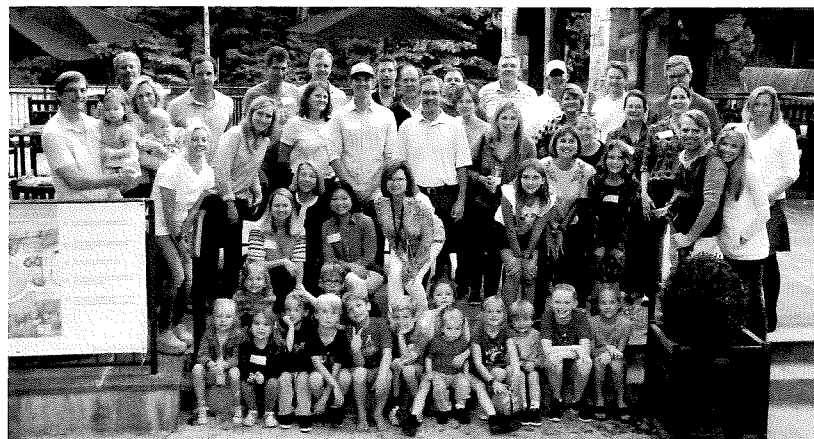

Recreate the Canopy

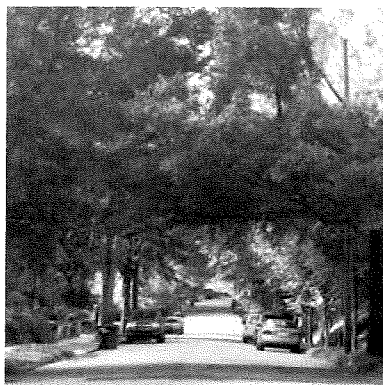
*BWH tree canopy in 1970**

For the past 30 years, Brookwood Hills has replanted trees annually to replace the grand oaks that once lined our streets but were removed or fell due to age, disease and storms. Now many of those recently planted trees are reaching mature heights and are ready to be pruned in a neighborhood-wide effort to Recreate the Canopy.

Chris Hastings with Arbormedics helped the Tree Committee develop a plan to prune the lower limbs of our street trees and to encourage the re-establishment of the beloved tree canopy that makes our neighborhood so unique. The goal of this program will also be to raise the canopy to improve vehicle and pedestrian clearance, and improve light penetration for security benefits.

A survey done by the Brookwood Hills Tree Committee identified a list of street trees that could benefit most from selective pruning, and those homeowners received a letter in early November outlining the opportunity to participate in the pruning project. The Brookwood Hills Garden Club and the Brookwood Hills Community Club have committed funds to offer a 20% discount on the price to homeowners to prune their trees. Arbormedics prices also include a volume discount in the cost, which are \$45-75 for smaller trees, \$100-200 for medium trees and \$300-400 for large trees, before the discount.

Requests for pruning will be accepted until November 30, at which time Chris Hastings will schedule the work for the months of December and January, and which for efficiency will be done by street. Any homeowner that did not receive a letter asking for their participation, and that has a street tree they wish to be pruned can contact a member

of the tree committee to discuss being added to the list. Payment for pruning services would be due before the work is started.

The Brookwood Hills Tree Committee includes Katrina Newton, Ramsay Battin, Kristin Cowart-Pierce, Eve Goldstein, Sara Jean Burke, Nathalie Fuson, Sallie Topfl and Matt Little (BWHCC board liaison).

Many thanks to the neighbors who have already agreed to have their trees pruned. This is a community effort to make our neighborhood even more beautiful than it already is!

Trees Atlanta's "NeighborWoods" Yard Tree Program offers Brookwood Hills property owners free front yard tree plantings. According to Trees Atlanta, the program's intent is "to lower summer temperatures and reduce energy consumption by investing in tree canopy cover for neighborhoods.... Urban trees decrease energy bills for residents, absorb pollutants, reduce maintenance costs for streets and storm water infrastructure, increase property values by making neighborhoods more beautiful, walkable, and desirable places to live, and combat the urban heat island effect."

Brookwood Hills also offers ladies tennis drills to the membership at various levels and times with tennis pros Jake Martyn and Lee King.

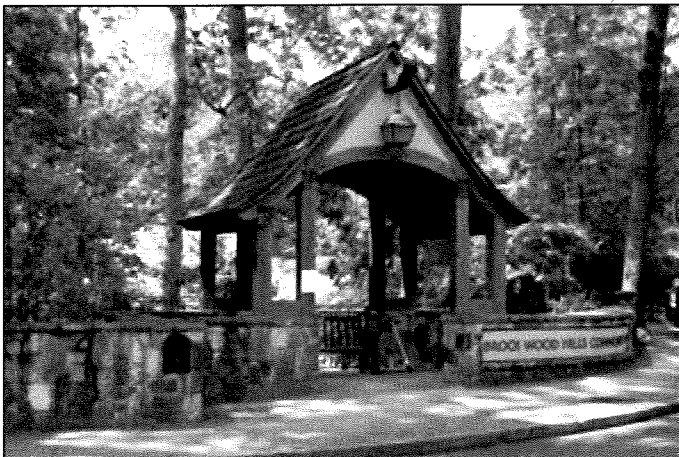
