Our Brookwood Hills community has a rich tradition of volunteerism both through individual and group efforts. Not so long ago, Twigs was an active volunteer group in our neighborhood committed to supporting Egelston Children's Hospital. BWH Twigs was highly successful, sponsoring many initiatives to raise money for Egelston. The most anticipated neighborhood party of the year (or so I've been told) was the Twigs annual spring cocktail party which raised money for Egelston and provided neighbors the opportunity to come together for a fun social event.

A volunteer spirit similar to Twigs has been reborn in Brookwood Hills, and it comes in the form of *Friends* – a community based network with the mis-

sion to support children, families and Children's Healthcare of Atlanta (the newly merged entity of Egelston and Scottish Rite Children's Hospitals) through volunteer service, fund-raising and advocacy opportunities. Being the first is not something new to BWH women. Lisa Bankoff of Brighton Road informed the group at the meeting that women in our neighborhood and Peachtree Battle area joined efforts to

As many of you know, a fire devastated our home on August 19, 1999. Fortunately, we were not at home when the fire started and no one was injured. A neighbor, Frank Summers, knew we were away for the evening and checked our home when he heard an unusual noise. After discovering that the house was on fire, he called 911, and his parents located us. Frank's quick response to not only an unusual noise but also a critical situation saved our home from being totally destroyed. When we arrived at the fire, the street was filled with caring friends and neighbors offering immediate assistance.

Unfortunately, several hours later, the fire rekindled and once again we faced losing not only what was left of our home but also all of our belongings. The fire department responded promptly; however, it was neighbors who came out of their homes and stopped on their morning walks that truly helped us save many of our irreplaceable treasures. As the Fire Department moved our belongings onto the front lawn, neighbors cleared the way by moving these items safely down the street. Their assistance continued throughout the day as some friends brought us refreshments while others helped us clean our furniture, inventory our household items, and offered assistance in locating the necessary services to help us begin putting things back together. Although many of those offering their help were good friends, we were struck by the number of Brookwood Hills residents that were not personal friends who reached out to help us in a crisis. How lucky we are to live a place filled with caring people!

We want to thank all of you who have touched our lives during the past several weeks. Although our homes, trees and pool are wonderful assets to Brookwood Hills, our neighborhood is truly defined by the people who live here.

We will be living nearby during the reconstruction and look forward to seeing all of you as we rebuild our home over the next several months!

Street Tree Health Program 1999

Street trees are owned by no one, but enjoyed by all. City budgets do not allow for the proper care of these vital trees, so they are often left defenseless against the assaults of urban life.

In recognition of the huge contribution the trees make by way of their shade, beauty, and character, the Brookwood Hills Community Club, Inc. has joined with Arborguard Tree Specialists to honor the trees that help to define our neighborhood.

Arborguard has created a special mixture of fertilizer, Polynure, and beneficial soil fungi that promotes tree health, fosters new root growth, and increases the effectiveness of fine feeder roots. This is the second year that we are offering this program. Last year we enrolled over 150 trees and are hoping to do even better this year. Because of the participation in 1998, Arborguard has given us the special price of \$40 for a large tree and \$20 for a small tree (10" diameter, belt high or less).

How can you participate? Simply fill out the form below to register.

As a recap

- Give your street trees some TLC by funding their treatment.
- Respond by filling out form with your request by Thanksgiving.
- Work will be done in early December.
- Treatment is effective for one year and should be repeated annually.
- Due to the special nature of this project, we can only treat street trees (trees within 6' of curb unless tree is part of our replanting program). Call Arborguard for information on treating your personal trees.
- You can prepay by enclosing check payable to Brookwood Hills Community Club, Inc. or choose to be billed by Arborguard after treatment.


BWH BOOK CLUB

We recently had our annual inspection on the park play structures. The inspector reminded us that the most important rule for a safe playground is adult supervi-

sion. The larger play structures have drop-offs and possible entrapments that could be hazardous for smaller children. The play structure next to the metal "horses" is more appropriate for children under 5 years. Please make sure that your child is using the appropriate equipment and is properly supervised. Also, please keep children off the park hills and banks. This is especially important on the hill above the grill area. Protecting the hills will help prevent both falls and further erosion.

SPEED HUMPS STILL ON TRACK





According to the City of Atlanta's Traffic and Transportation Department speed

humps are coming to a street near you next year. We are scheduled to have speed humps and the necessary signage installed on Brighton Road in February and Huntington Road is scheduled for March. Please keep in mind that weather effects the ability of the city to do this work. If we should have an extremely rainy period the city will, of course, need to finish their current projects before they begin work in our neighborhood. One positive effect of this year's drought was that the city work crews had fewer rain delays through summer.

We are still working to have the storm drains on Montclair re-graded so that our cars do not fall into these large holes. The city did work on the manhole covers on Montclair and smoothed over those areas. In addition, we are requesting the city do a ride through of the neighborhood to look at our streets for possible repaving. The City of Atlanta does not do the actual repaving but sets the priorities for the State. The State actually does the work or contracts it out to private firms. A ride through was done last year, but since some of our streets are deteriorating at an alarming rate we want to keep Brookwood Hills a priority.

In addition to on-site hospital volunteer opportunities available to the group, Friends is charged with raising money to support four important current initiatives which will enhance Children's Healthcare of Atlanta' commitment to children. These four initiatives are: a Response Transport Ambulance to safely and efficiently bring children to the hospitals when a child requires specialized tertiary care; establish for the first time a research fund for the physicians that will allow them to apply for seed grants to carry out new and exciting clinical research in such areas as cardiology and neurosurgery; support the purchase of the Lightspeed CT Scanner, a critical piece of diagnostic equipment that quickly locates otherwise undetectable, life-threatening conditions or possible brain trauma; and provide The Big Apple Circus Clown Care Unit, professional doctors of delight who conduct clown rounds five days a week and treat the children's funny bones.
