Whether you knew it or not, when you signed all those papers on closing day, you became a part of history. Placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980, Brookwood Hills has been recognized as a unique and historic place to call home. Our neighborhood mirrors the historical circumstances of Atlanta's growth and development. For example, some of the bloodiest

battles of the Civil War were fought in our immediate area. Many of the neighborhood's first homes were designed by celebrated architects of the 1920s, and our curvilinear streets and planned tree arbor are in direct response to B.F. Kauffman's familiarity with Frederic Law Olmsted's landscape design. To live in Brookwood Hills means you are a member of a community that believes in preserving its historical status while continuing to provide the neighborhood feeling that was sought by its crafters.

Many of our neighbors are involved in preservation efforts on local, state, and national levels. The Atlanta Preservation Center, for example, is an Atlanta-based non-profit that seeks to enhance Atlanta's quality of life by promoting conservation and preservation of the city's significant buildings and neighborhoods through educational programs and advocacy. Allison Alarcon, Harry Gilham, Elaine Luxemburger, and Lauren Monroe have all served on the APC's board, while many other neighbors are active members. In addition, Brookwood Hills residents have on two separate occasions graciously opened their homes for tours to benefit the APC.

At the state level, The Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation is the largest state-wide nonprofit preservation organization in the United States, and many, many BWH residents are members. The continued on page 3

President's Message

On Saturday, September 22, Sarah Armstrong, Diane John, Jean O'Halloran, Hayes Wilson, and I, cleaned out the park storage buildings to "make ready" for the construction that is to begin soon. It was a much dreaded task, but one that became enjoyable.

My time was spent organizing the stacks of community club documents that had piled up over time. There were documents dating back to the 1950's. The vast amount of volunteer hours that have been given to this neighborhood is amazing. As I paused to read some of the documents, I was reminded of what an incredible neighborhood in which we live. I wished I had grown up here and realized how lucky my children are to be here.

I read the first issue of Brooknotes, which was called the "Brookwood By Word." It was published in the summer of 1974. Dan O'Connor was the Community Club President. His daughter Maureen was 7-year-old. (Maureen and her husband recently purchased her childhood home on Northwood.) I enjoyed reading about "Santa In the Park," complete with a bonfire, carols, and hot chocolate. I don't think our current fire marshal would let us revive that old tradition. But that one has been replaced by many other incredible events.

It was interesting to see that some issues remain the same. Here is an excerpt from one of the letters I found that was addressed to the neighborhood:

"We have received many complaints regarding speeding and reckless driving not only in the heavily congested area of the pool and park, but on most of the streets in Brookwood Hills. Such irresponsibility has created a most hazardous condition for both children and adults throughout our residential area.....We are requesting your cooperation in eliminating this totally unnecessary hazard to life and limb and assist us in keeping Brookwood Hills a safe and pleasant place in which to L-I-V-E."

This letter was written July 24, 1961 by Edmund Rhett, Chairman of Traffic and Safety Committee. It was sad to read this letter, especially since the problem continues today. Please keep this in mind as your drive our streets and talk to the young drivers in your home.

But despite the speeding issue, our neighborhood is certainly one of America's finest. There are stacks and stacks of documents as proof. Thanks to all of you who continue to be good neighbors and keep our community so special.

Trust's objectives are to reclaim historic properties from neglect and destruction, to restore places of historic interest to their original luster, and to revitalize communities and neighborhoods in disrepair or threatened by unplanned development. Brookwood Hill's own Bradley Hale is a past board President of the Georgia Trust, and currently serves on the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Sheffield Hale, his son, also has been a tireless advocate for preservation, and is currently serving as chairman for the Georgia Trust. BWH neighbor Frank White oversees The Trust's Revolving Fund, through which houses are designated and deeded to The Trust for resale and preservation.

The Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation sponsors several events throughout the year, and its biggest annual fund-raiser — The Preservation Ball — is being chaired this year by Erica and Stewart Speed, of 172 Huntington. 




