

Which house will be the spookiest?





Jimmy Henderson was born in 1913 in Detroit, Michigan. He moved to Atlanta in 1922 when his father was transferred here by the Packard Motor Company. After graduating from Tech High, he met his future wife Edith on a blind date in 1936. They raised two sons Edward and Ross and now have been married 64 years. Mr. Henderson served as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Army and is a World War Two Veteran. After the war he went into the insurance business with Spratlin Harrington until he retired.

The Hendersons moved to 250 Brighton Road in 1955 and he and Edith were very active in volunteering in the neighborhood. Mr. Henderson served as Brookwood Hills Community Club President from 1970-71. Edith was a well-known landscape architect in Atlanta. She lectured all over the country and created the landscape design for the first public housing in the U.S.—Techwood/Clark Howell Homes. Together they were quite a team. Edith is now home-bound with Alzheimer's and Jimmy is her full-time caregiver.

Annual Tree Planting Program Offered

The annual neighborhood Tree Planting Program will take place this fall thanks to the generosity of the Brookwood Hills Garden Club. The Garden Club earmarked funds in May of 2002 for the fall planting that year, however only about half of the funds were used and so the balance is available for planting in 2003. This donation to the community club will provide for the planting of approximately twelve trees.

A list has been dran up of the areas where the neighborhood has lost trees and homeowners are being contacted about the planting and care of a new tree. If you are interested in a tree and have not been contacted, please call Katrina Newton at 404-355-6574.

The goal of the annual Tree Planting Program is to maintain the tree canopy that shades our streets and sidewalks and makes our neighborhood so unique. A list of available trees includes varieties recommended by the city, various arborists, and Bold Springs Nursery, which has provided our trees at below market prices for the last six years. Whenever possible, larger trees are planted in a homeowner's yard and smaller to medium-sized trees at the the street. Large trees will not be planted under wires due to the risk of unhealthy pruning by utility companies.

The Brookwood Hills Garden Club has been a supporter of the Tree Planting Program on a number of occasions throughout its history. This is in addition to a number of other projects including landscaping and beautification of the renovated Community Club. For the last two years, the neighborhood community club budget has not been able to include funds for tree planting, and so this program would not have been offered except for the generosity of the Garden Club and neighbors that have supported the bi-annual Acorn Auction. Please thank them and encourage your board members to continue to support the Planting Program as well.

If any neighbors are interested in a tree for their backyards, these can be included in our order, but would be the responsibility of the homeowner. The costs of trees planted within approximately ten feet of the sidewalk or street are included and covered in the Planting Program.

WHAT'S UP WITH OUR TREES?

Look down on Brookwood Hills from the air and you don't see beautiful homes, carefully manicured lawns, kids playing in the park, diving championships or families walking their dogs. What you see is one of the other things that make our neighborhood special. Things that give it character and grace. Our trees. Street trees. Yard trees. Volunteer trees. And park trees.

Trees give us shade from the harsh sun. They add to our property values. They lower our utility bills by up to 50%. They help manage the run-off from rainstorms and shield us from the encroachment of development around us.

Unfortunately, in the past few years our trees have suffered. Unlike forest trees, city trees have a hard life. Pollution and construction choke them, cars park on their roots and improper trimming leaves them vulnerable to disease. Streets and sidewalks channel away precious water in droughts.

All of these factors have taken a toll on our trees and the trees of Atlanta. Water Oaks in particular have caused many problems in the city and in our neighborhood. The stress puts them (and all of us) at risk. Unhealthy trees are not something we can or should ignore. But just because a tree is large or old doesn't mean it has reached the end of its lifecycle. It is not necessarily a hazard to people or property. Properly maintained, many of our grandest old trees have only reached middle-age. A professional arborist can advise you on the heath of all your trees and make suggestions for their care. Recently we contacted Cheryl Kortemeier at Trees Atlanta to find out what we can do to improve tree health and safety. She provided a great deal of very helpful advice.

Be aware.

Look at your trees. Are they visibly stressed? Full of dead limbs? Leaning? Vine-covered? Damaged from abuse or weather? Infested with insects?

Have your trees checked.

Contact a professional arborist to evaluate any tree you have questions about. They may recommend thinning the canopy, pruning, fertilization, treatment for insects or disease, cabling weak branches, mulching and even something as simple as watering. They may also recommend removal if appropriate. But, if removal is necessary, you must adhere to the City Tree Ordinance (www.ci.atlanta.ga.us) and apply for a tree removal permit. This is not a "nice-to-have". It is required by law. For more information, contact the City of Atlanta Arborist Office at 404.330.6076.

Care for your street trees.

Mulch them year-round. Water them weekly during times of drought. If you think a street tree needs to be evaluated, trimmed or removed you should contact the City Arborist In Charge of Public Right-of-Way at 404-817-6853. One word of caution, once you engage them they may take more extreme measures than you had anticipated.

Keep planting trees.

People with great vision planted these wonderful trees for us years ago. They thoughtfully placed them to line our streets, shade our homes and beautify our views. Let's do the same. For ourselves, our children and the many families that will live here in the years to come. Cheryl had a number of suggestions for what to plant. Ideally we should plant trees that will have a long life provide ample shade and that are disease resistant. Trees planted should be able to tolerate our warm climate (Zone 7/8). Native varieties such as those recommended by The Georgia Forestry Commission (www.gfc.state.ga.us) are ideal.

For fast-growing varieties consider Red Maple or Nuttall Oak. For the best shade: Oaks and Tulip Poplar will grow tall and spread wide. For a long life, look for Oaks or Lacebark Elms. Bradford Pears and Silver Maples don't provide the long lasting benefits of the hardwood. These last two varieties typically become hazardous after a few years due to their weak branching structure. Of course the neighborhood wouldn't be the same without our ornamental Dogwoods and Crape Myrtles.

You might check out the Trees Atlanta 4th Annual Tree Sale on October 18th in Piedmont Park. It's a great time to find over 100 varieties of replacement trees.
