The Battle of Peachtree Creek 150 Years Later -Why It Still Matters

Our Brookwood Hills neighborhood inherited hallowed ground, the Civil War battlefield of Peachtree Creek, where close to 4,000 Americans were killed, wounded, or went missing in three hours of fighting on July 20, 1864.

Historical markers line the entrances to our neighborhood for a distinct and equally tragic reason. Henry Grady, editor of the *Atlanta Constitution*, said after the war regarding Atlanta: "Every foot of the soil about the city in which I live is sacred as a battleground of the Republic. Every hill that invests it is hallowed to you by the blood of your brothers, who died for your victory, and doubly hallowed to us by the blood of those who died hopeless, but undaunted, in defeat—sacred soil to all of us."



The summer of 1864 was a critical juncture for both the North and South. Lincoln did not expect to win reelection. If Lincoln was not reelected, a peace-seeking democrat could have come to power and given the South its independence. The fate of the American nation was at stake during the summer of 1864—to decide if Lincoln's war to preserve the Union and abolish slavery would be fulfilled. *Continued on Page 5*



BWH Neighbors Honored with Woodward Academy Alumni Award



Annual Tree Planting in Brookwood Hills

Help Restore Our Canopy - Plant a Tree!

It seems like every time I drive or walk through our neighborhood, I notice that another one our majestic trees has been removed, leaving nothing but an ugly stump. Brookwood Hills is losing trees at a record pace. To restore our beautiful "urban forest," it's critical to continue our annual neighborhood plantings. Fewer trees result in hotter summers and the disappearance of the classic leafiness of our historic neighborhood. Large canopy trees (oaks and maples) are an important part of what makes Brookwood Hills so special.

It's not just street trees that are crucial for our canopy, but front yard trees as well. In front yards, trees have more root room and don't have to contend with Georgia Power lines.

Are you a NIMFY (Not In My Front Yard)? I used to be one also. I don't want a tree there, I thought! I love that green grass! A tree would spoil the view of my classic architecture! If you fit this description, please reconsider.



Here's how you can help:

1. Volunteer in the Annual Tree Planting

Saturday November 8th, 9:00 am to 12:00 pm We'll start out in the Pavilion in the Brookwood Hills Park for bagels and coffee.

Last year, we planted 25 trees in the neighborhood. This year, we plan to beat last year's this number! Anyone can help. The work is not overly strenuous, and there will be experienced Trees Atlanta Staff to assist us.

This is appropriate for the entire family. This is also a great way for our teenagers and scouts to get service hours! Anyone over the age of 10 can help.

2. Purchase an oak or maple tree to plant.

If you want a new tree in your front yard or at the street, you may choose a tree from a list of site-appropriate trees that are better adapted to urban conditions. These will cause fewer problems than the water oaks planted here many years ago.

Trees Atlanta is offering BWH residents:

- Small (15 gallon) trees for \$50.00
- Large (25 gallon) trees for \$75.00

These are deeply discounted prices and include planting by volunteers. The cost of the trees alone (without the labor) is \$200.00. Trees Atlanta is also offering the opportunity for residents to purchase trees for back yards, but the cost will be slightly higher. You will be responsible for planting backyard trees yourself.


3. Donate to Trees Atlanta

The Battle of Peachtree Creek: 150 Years Later - Why It Still Matters

The Battle of Peachtree Creek was the first in a series of bloody battles for Atlanta during July and August of 1864. It was the Confederate's first attempt to drive Sherman's army from the gates of Atlanta. Although well envisioned, the attack failed in large part due to poor communication and execution. Fighting in the battle was Union Colonel Benjamin Harrison, future President of the United States.

For Rufus Mead of the 5th Connecticut, it was "the saddest day I ever saw...the suffering & dying conditions of poor fellows that lay there wounded in every part of the body...doctors were busy cutting off limbs which were piled up in heaps to be carried off and buried, while the stench was horrible."

When Atlanta fell to Union forces on September 2, it can be argued that Union victory at Atlanta began at Peachtree Creek, the very neighborhood we call home today. After Peachtree Creek, Hood tried four more times to defeat Sherman's army, but to no avail. With Atlanta's capture, Lincoln almost overnight became the favorite to win the 1864 election and ensure Union victory and a reunified nation.

Today, as we walk through our tranquil neighborhood, to the pool and the park, it is hard to imagine what transpired here 150 years ago, hard to imagine the men in blue and gray fighting through an impenetrable forest in the 95 degree Georgia heat. Georgian and Illinois farm boys violently clashed along present day Brighton Road and up towards where CVS and Piedmont Hospital sit today. Along Peachtree and Collier roads and in present day Tanyard Creek Park, Union soldiers recalled burying hundreds of unknown Confederates in unmarked ditches.

Yet while the landscape has changed, the story of what happened here remains—it is upon this very land that our American nation fought for its very existence. It is the American Civil War that established the country we know today at the cost of 750,000 Americans lives, including many in our own backyards. This is a vivid reminder that we live upon not just an important historical site but ultimately hallowed and sacred ground.






















